CONGROVE'S ASSAILANT

Henderson, Carney's Pal, Makes an Important Admission.

A THIRD MAN IN THE CASE

Green, a Companion of the Other Two, Told Henderson of Finding Congrove in the Shed, and of Having Struck Him—He Will be Arrested.

CORNWALL, Ont., Sept. 15.—An unexpected light has been thrown on the death of Frank Congrove who was found lying in a coal shed on Water street in this town on Tuesday morning and died the following day.

The coroner's inquest was held in the Music Hall and after the evidence of Wagner and Gravelly, who made the post-mortem, had been taken, Carney, also in the Music Hall, was examined.

The two men left Cornwall on Tuesday morning in company with another man named Henderson, who was found in the plums. The previous evening they went to Henderson, N.Y., and then to Kingston, Ont. On Thursday afternoon Carney and Henderson crossed to Morrisburg, leaving on Monday evening for Cornwall in the death of Congrove, to which their disappearance gave color. The two men were brought to Cornwall last evening by Policeman Smith, and were called after the medical man had given evidence.

Carney told how he had spent Monday night, including the stealing of the plums in company with Henderson and Green, and that they had left because the owner of the plums had threatened to call the police. Henderson was then called and corroborated the evidence of Carney, but in telling the story of the journey from Cornwall to Watlington he stated that Green had told them that after they had passed on Monday evening, after stealing the plums, he went into the coal shed, which was near his boarding house, and there saw a man lying in a coal shed. He went up and asked what he was doing there. The man said he was waiting for a boat to go to New York. Green went to bed, but got up and went into the coal shed, pretending to be another party. He struck the man again and received a blow on the head. He then went to bed and next morning went to the coal shed and saw the man lying there. There were others in the coal shed, but he did not see them. He said the man must have had a bad fall.

Carney was recalled, and at first was unwilling to tell what Green had said about Henderson, but finally made a clean breast of it. The two stories agreeing in most particulars, the coroner's verdict was given in favor of Henderson. He was taken to the hospital and is now recovering.
