

Colville, the whole of Col. Broadwood's column would have gone under.
He forced the Boers back, and evidently without much opposition, as by the time he had got his artillery in position the only resistance that was offered to the advance of his infantry came from the guns firing shrapnel at

came from the guns firing shrapnel at too long a range.

According to The Chronicle, the Boers cut off the water supply of Bloemfontein, and destroyed the pumping gear, as well as the field telegraph. The waterworks were, however, new and the old supply of spring water, if not very good, is still available. The Boer force is variously estimated at from 6,000 to 15,000, but it may yet be found that these figures have yet be found that these figures have exaggerated their strength.

The British losses in artillery in th present war have been exceptionally heavy. Altogether 23 guns have been captured by the Boers, who, on their part, have only lost seven.

LED BY A U. S. OFFICER. New York, April 3.-The Journal as sumes that the American named Reichman said to have been in command of the Boers at the Bushman's kop ambush, was Capt. Carl Reichman, U. S. A. He was detached from command of a company in the Seven-teenth infantry when ordered to South Africa, Jan. 5. He was sent to the Cape to report on all military operations and is vir tually a United States representative. He reached the front about four weeks ago, and, like the French and German attaches, is be lieved to be helping the forces in whatever

way he can. A Washington despatch said last night that the war department had received no report recently from Capt. Reichmann. The report that he was fighting with the Boers was a startling announcement to the department. Capt. Reichmann is still officially connected with the United States government and such an act of his might ring on grave diplomatic difficulties.

The cables giving this report

handed at once to Adft.-Gen. Corbin. "Such a thing as this," said the general, "is inconceivable. I cannot believe that Capt. Reichmann has done this without first forwarding a resig-nation to the war department. I have been asked several times to-day whe tehr he had resigned. I cannor believe that he would take part in the Transvaal's battles without first leaving the United States army, As I have said, such a thing is inconceivable under military law.

Capt. Reichmann is one of the most conservative officers in the army.
That is one of the reasons why he
was sent to the Transvaal."

If Capt. Reichmann has joined in the fighting without first resigning from the United States army he will be lia-ble to court-martial on his return; If he does not return he will be dis-missed the service in disgrace, if it be found true that he joined the Boers der the United States.
