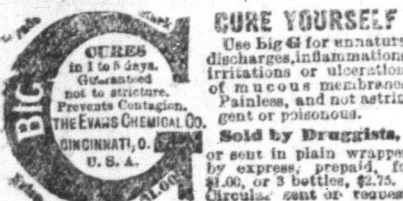

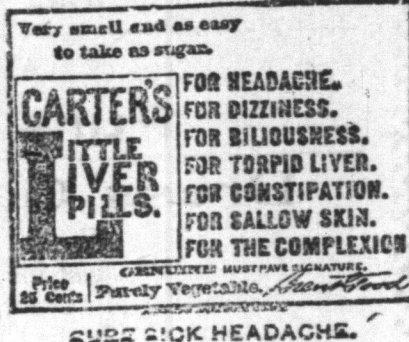

OUTLOOK NOW VERY BRIGHT

Conservatives Will Soon be in Power Says Leader Whitney.

An Attempt to Bribe Opposition Members Indignantly Rejected.

Ottawa, Sept. 23.—J. P. Whitney, M. L. A., was in the city over night, and in an interview said the outlook for his party reaching power, was bright. He charged that Opposition members had been approached with bribes and offices to support the government, but mentioned no names. He did not know much about the conditions in Renfrew, but thought North Grey would be easy for the Conservatives.

Evening Citizen, says the loyalty of the members of the Opposition is unquestioned. Although there is some foundation for the reports that members have been approached, such approaches have been indignantly repulsed. One gentleman was offered the Speakership of the house, another was tendered a timber limit, and so on, but the Opposition remains loyal.

BOTH STONED

One Man Fatally Shot, and Iron and Steel Works Surrounded by a Howling Mob.

Seranton, Pa., Sept. 23.—Nine companies of the Thirtieth Regiment, ordered out last night, are in camp at Oliphant, near here. Lieut.-Col. Stilwell, in command, sent detachments to the different collieries in the vicinity shortly after the regiment's arrival this morning. The Hungarian shot in the attack upon Deputy Sheriff McAndrew and Superintendent Burkheiser yesterday died to-day. Charles and Bert London were waylaid by a crowd near Throop, Pa., to-day and wounded. The Londons have been employed in the Lackawanna colliery in Oliphant, which angered the strikers, who first stoned them and afterwards began shooting. Bert was shot in the thigh and Charles in the right leg. They were brought to the Lackawanna hospital here. Both will recover. General Gobin arrived here to-day and had a conference with Sheriff Schadt.

CRITICAL STATE OF AFFAIRS. Harrisburg, Pa., Sept. 23.—The strike situation at the American Iron and Steel Works at Lebanon has become so critical that troops may be ordered there by Governor Stone within 24 hours. A committee of citizens of Lebanon waited upon the Governor to-day and earnestly requested that he furnish the city with military protection. The Governor has the matter under advisement, and unless the situation improves troops will likely be sent there to maintain order and protect life and property. The city was in a state of excitement all night. There was firing of pistols for hours near the American works, and the colored men who had just arrived at the works were terrified, as were the citizens. About midnight Wm. Hoffmann, aged 17, was shot. He died in the hospital this morning. He was a messenger in the office of the company and had attended an entertainment in the opera house. On his way home he was struck by a bullet. To-day the plant is surrounded by a threatening crowd.

GROWING WORSE. Wilkesbarre, Sept. 23.—Sheriff Jacobs, of Luzerne county, has not yet asked Governor Stone for troops, but conditions are growing worse. Some non-union miners were stoned at Warrior and the sheriff had to send the squads of deputies to that place. All is now reported quiet at the scene of the disturbance.

TROOPS FOR LEBANON. Harrisburg, Pa., Sept. 23.—G. F. Gobin, who is in command of the troops in the hard coal strike region, was ordered by Governor Stone to-night to send the first battalion of the 12th regiment to Lebanon to assist the sheriff in preserving the peace where the iron and steel works of the American Iron and Steel Manufacturing Co. have been on strike for nearly five months. The battalion, which has been on duty at Shenandoah, ever since the troops were sent there, left that town to-night for Lebanon, in command of Col. Clement. The troops reached Lebanon shortly before eight o'clock.
