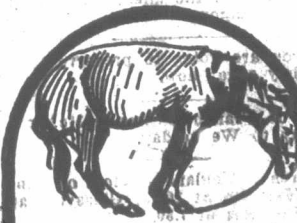
William Hawthorne is building a new barn and Street Miller is building a new garage.
