The regular even song of the Church of England was solemnized, the lessons being read by Mr. W. O. Raymond, who will graduate in a few days from the U. N. B. Mr. Raymond is a son of Rev. W. O. Raymond, of St. John, and is studying for the Ministry of the Church of England.

At the conclusion of the service the congregation led by the band united in singing the National Anthem.

The Sermon.

Although Rev. Canon Roberts was suffering from a severe cold and was decidedly indisposed he preached with his accustomed force and vigor of thought and expression, He said, in

The text was: Jer. ix., 24.—"Let him that glorieth glory in this, that he understandeth and knoweth Me, that I am the Lord which exercises loving kindness, judgment, and right-cousness in the earth; for in these things I delight, saith the Lord."

Jehowah speaks here by the mouth of the prophet Jeremiah a warning sgainst man's glorying in his own wisdom, his might on his riches. The Jews were ever inclined to boost of their national superiority as God's chosen people, and that was indeed a legitimate cause at least for gratitude and thanksgiving. But unhappily, they were content to glory in their privileges, while they were not careful either to use them aright themselves, or to walk worthy of them, or to extend to others the benefits and blessing of them. We, too, need the warning. We are justly proud of the great Empire of which our homored Dominion forms a part, and of the name and deeds of our Anglo Saxon ancestors. Those of us who have come here today as a corporate body feel that our title "Sous of England" is a very honorable one. How then in this house of God ought we to regard that honor? Not as a cause of glorying but as a reasen for humble self-examination with regard to the duties and responsibilities which it imposes on us. The wisdom, the might, the wealth of England, these are not her highest claims on the respect and allegiance of herohildren but rather ber understanding and knowledge of God, as the Lord which doth "exercise loving kindness, judgment and righteousness in the earth, for in these things I delight, saith the Lord." And so with regard to each one of ourselves, the great thought on which our minds should dwell to day is not of the great persess attaching to the name of England, and reflected in a measure upon us as Sons of England, but of the degree of knowledge and understanding of God which we possess, and the fruits which that knowledge shall produce in our daily live

We Have Poured Out the Fuliness

We Have Foured Out the Fullness of our hearts concerning the great and beloved Queen whose death is still a fresh sorrow in our memories, and whom yesterday we honored in conjunction—at his own desire—with him who now rules over us. We shall be called a month hence to unite with the whole British Empire at his coronation. We hope and pray that then, or before then, we shall be called to rejoice also in the proclamation of a permanent and honorable peace. These things will require a full expression of our loyalty and patriotism. Meanwhile I would direct the thoughts of my brethren of the Soms of England chiefly to the great object which the church so urgently presses on us at this feetival of the Trinity. One fundamental principle of our Society is simple faith in the plain teachings of the Holy Scriptures. Our true glory is therefore in the understanding and knowledge of God which that Divine word of revelation imparts.

The loyalty which is the root principle of our Society embraces loyalty to God, loyalty to our Christian fatth, loyalty to our homes and families, loyalty to the land of our birth and residence, loyalty to the great British Empire, loyalty to the principles of the constitution, of our motherland, loyalty to the ancient charter of her liberties; and all this is, as it were, summed up in loyalty to Our Soverleign Look King Edward, the personal representative of England's power, authority and greatness.

Such has been the happy fortune of those of our brother Canadians who have been called to fight their country's battles in South Africa. On deadliest fields of peril and carnage they have shewn themselves the bravest of the brave, and have added glory to the laurels which already crowned the brow of our young Dominion. It may finght sand honor in bloody conflict with her foes, but we may maintain them as honorably and as effectually in the peaceful struggle of our daily lives to be upright, true and faithful in all our relations towards our fellownes, so walking bravely forward in all good words and works of love that the world around us shall be the better for our living in it, and the name and fame of Canada shine brighter for the example we have set and the character we have maintained.
