New York, Feb. 13.—The market during the morning exhibited strength, with influential buying of Union Pacific and Northern Pacific, Reading, Steel, Copper and some other issues. Some traders took on large lines of stocks and the supply was limited, although at the advance some 10,000 shares were sold on London Arbitrage; \$200,000 of the New York City bonds sold on the curb around 104 1/2, and prospects for the success of the loan, together with the general belief in the regular dividend, generally prevented stocks from declining much beyond one-half the distance from low to high after a panic break. Inside support has recently appeared in Steel and Copper. No one pretends that the situation is unqualifiedly bullish; if this were true the best corporation stocks in America could not be bought at current figures. We think, however, that matters will work out satisfactorily to the conservative and patient buyer for the long pull.
