ATHLETIC MEET AT NIGHT.

One of the biggest night athletic meets ever pulled off in this city was that held last night at Britannia Park in connection with the Labor Day celebration.

The capacity of the grandstand was taxed to the limit, while a large number of people had to find seats in the bleachers. The grounds were brilliantly illuminated, arc lamps being placed at intervals around the course, and a number of incandescents lighting the stand.

In consequence the spectators could follow the contestants as they circled the track and discern their relative positions. The events were all keenly contested, and as all were handicapped affairs the finishes were close and exciting. The 91st Highlanders' Regimental Band was in attendance, and the music added greatly to the enjoyment.

The card was a lengthy one, and although the first race was called shortly after 8 o'clock, it was nearly 11 before the card was completed. The chief events were the 100 and 220 yards dashes in which Bobby Kerr competed. Both these races were captured by the auburn-haired favorite, but such handicaps were given his competitors that he had to exert himself to win. In the 220 he just managed to beat the time first by long odds, the last few feet. E. Farrell, with an 8 yards start, defeated Bobby in the first heat of the 100, but in the final Kerr won by about two feet.

In the five mile match race between Sellers, of Toronto, and Adams, of this city, the former won easily, beating the local man by over half a mile.

The bicycle racing provided some interesting sport, but was productive of some unpleasantness in the half mile event, when Anderson claimed that Andrews fouled him. The judges admitted that there was some ground for complaint against the riding of Andrews, but they did not think they were justified in disqualifying him.
