There upon a desperate struggle ensued The strikers were finally driven off, but they returned to the docks and stoned the members of a steamship crew. Later there was a fight with the police. Clubs were freely used A dozen men were seriously injured while the police suffered from stone and kicks. An attack was made or a warehouse, goods were thrown overboard, and the police were pelteto with chunks of beef. Another hand to hand clash resulted. More strikers and police were hurt, and the warehouses of the Liverpool-Dublin Steamship Company were burned.
