Some Quick Lunches.

The boys on this side of the Atlantic, and doubtless the girls, have all purchased gum, chocolate bar, or peanuts, by slipping a nickel into a slot machine. On the continent of Europe this contrivance is extensively employed as a quick-lunch device in catering to street boys and laborers. Many of the cheaper restaurants of Paris, Berlin, Brussels, and Antwerp are equipped with machines, which in response to the necessary coin, yields rolls, tarts or biscuits. Some at certain times of the day will fill, with

hot tea or coffee, the cup which is chained below. One cheap restaurant in the dock region of Antwerp has seven machines yielding respectively chocolate-bar, peanuts, buses, doughnuts, tarts, cafe noir, and coffee with milk. The Telephone Refreshment Room at St. Paul is probably one of the most interesting in America. This palatial establishment is equipped with numerous small tables capable of accommodating a party of four; but any party, however small, is entitled to the exclusive use of one table. In the middle of the table is a tele-

phone connecting with the office; and the orders are given by the numbers on the menu card. Thus a party of three might order two of 7 and one of 6 with three 8's on the side. Almost instantly the order is forthcoming—two peach melbas and one maple sundae with water ices. The energetic owner of this establishment has patented his system by patent. His private telephone connects with the city and long distance wires; so that a customer while eating his luncheon may converse with Duluth, or Winnipeg, and have the charges included with the other times of his bill.

World's Great Cities.

With a population of 7,252,000, London maintains its lead as the world's largest city. This is for 1911, the count having been made a few weeks ago. New York in 1910, had a population of 4,766,000, which is estimated to be close to 5,000,000 now. With the recent annexations of populous suburbs, which have added over 900,000 to its total, Berlin has 3,500,000 inhabitants, and is thus the third city. It has jumped not only above Tokyo and Chicago, which were only a few thousand ahead of it in the last cen-

sus count, but by taking in its suburbs, it has gone beyond Paris, which was more than 600,000 in advance of it a few months ago. Unless Paris annexes its own immediate outposts, which, in the aggregate, have 400,000 or 500,000 people, she will have to surrender the leadership permanently to the German capital. The world has 10 cities of over 1,000,000 population, and three of these—New York, Chicago and Philadelphia—are in the United States. Russia has two such cities, and England, France, Germany, Austria and Japan have one each. Baird's Liniment Cures Colds, Etc.

Cable News.

SPECIAL EVENING TELEGRAM. CARIBBEAN, July 19. The striking seamen and dockers here got a dampening when the fire brigade turned streams of water on them. The cold bath only aroused them to greater violence, and they stoned the firemen and police. Thereupon a desperate struggle ensued. The strikers were finally driven off, but they returned to the docks and stoned the members of a steamship crew. Later there was a fight with the police. Clubs were freely used. A dozen men were seriously injured, while the police suffered from stones. An attack was made on a warehouse, goods were thrown overboard, and the police were pelted with chunks of beef. Another hand to hand clash resulted. More strikers and police were hurt, and the warehouses of the Liverpool-Dublin Steamship Company were burned.

SPECIAL TO EVENING TELEGRAM. LONDON, July 19. The announcement to-day that Mr. Balfour will go to the continent to take the cure early in August is regarded as significant, and is widely accepted as an indication of a peaceful settlement of the constitutional crisis. A denial was issued by the Unionist leader that the condition of his health necessitated the trip. This disposes of the suggestion that he was obeying the orders of his physician, and is taken as confirmation for the belief that he does not anticipate any vital political disturbance over the Veto Bill, such as would be created by a deadlock of the two chambers and the appointment of a large number of new peers.

SPECIAL TO EVENING TELEGRAM. MONTREAL, July 19. Serious disturbances occurred here to-day. Strikers attacked the men loading the Red Star steamer. When the police intervened, the crowd took their stand with the strikers. The police were assailed on all sides. Stones, crockery and other household utensils were showered on their heads from the windows of the adjacent houses. Finally they were forced to use their revolvers.

SPECIAL TO EVENING TELEGRAM. LONDON, July 19. "Truth" says that Lord Knollys, the principal private secretary to King George, is about to retire, and that he will be succeeded by Lord Stanfordham.

SPECIAL TO EVENING TELEGRAM. LISLE, July 19. Private Clifford, a Canadian, won the first place in the Prince of Wales competition in to-day's shooting, with a score of 81 out of a possible 85. The trophy was the Association's badge and \$500.

SPECIAL TO EVENING TELEGRAM. LONDON, July 19. The Foreign Office denies the report that Ambassador Bryce is contemplating retirement from his position as Ambassador at Washington.
