CETTINGE, To-day.
 Montenegro forces made a fierce attack on Scutari last night. According to official reports, the engagement lasted the whole night, the Montenegrins captured two lines of posts west and east fronts. The Turks attempted a counter-attack but were repulsed. The Montenegrin losses were heavy. The fall of Scutari is considered imminent.

NEW MOTOR CAR. A new motor car for Mr. George Macmillan arrived from London on the s.s. Kanawha. The car is a "Sunbeam" of excellent design and the best of its kind ever imported here.

DIVERT AT BARBADOS. The Dunure, Capt. Hartley, has reached Barbados, the passage from Pernambuco occupying 15 days. The Dunure, if a cargo can be obtained, will load molasses for St. John's.

NASCOPIC FROM SYDNEY. The s.s. Nasopic, Capt. Falk, 29 hours from Sydney, reached port this morning, bringing 2,400 tons of coal. She left Sydney at 3 a.m. yesterday and entered the narrows at 8 a.m. to-day. The run is an exceptionally quick one.

Predicts Welcome Here for Imperial Press Conference.

Ottawa, April 21.—The Prime Minister was asked yesterday for a statement in regard to the proposal to hold an Imperial Press Conference in Canada within the next two years. Mr. Borden in reply said:—

"An intimation has been conveyed to me that a movement is on foot to inaugurate an Imperial Press Conference in Canada, to be held in 1914. Such a conference would be of great Imperial importance and I am confident that not only the Federal Government but the Provincial Governments as well would be disposed to give the movement every reasonable encouragement."

"It is said that delegates are expected from the British Islands, from India, from the great Dominions, and from many other parts of the Empire. The members of the conference could not fail to receive a very warm and cordial reception in Canada and their visit would undoubtedly be both timely and important from an Imperial as well as from a purely Canadian standpoint."

How to Make Old Painted Floors Resemble Hardwood.

This may be done by the house-keeper herself by the use of a ready-mixed paint to be procured at any paint shop. First clean the floor and allow to dry thoroughly, then apply a coat of flat color paint and allow to dry for at least forty-eight hours. If necessary to cover thoroughly the floor, apply a second coat of the flat paint. Before the second coat is applied make sure that the first one is perfectly dry, or the paint will cleave from the boards. When the paint is dry and the floor well covered, apply with a varnish brush any of the desired colors. They are found in oak, mahogany, cherry, and other colors. One or two coats of the varnish may be applied to the floor as desired. This floor finish requires the same care that any varnished floor requires and is considered to be the best finish for old painted floors. A coat of the same varnish applied every six months or year, according to the wear of the floor, will keep them in fine condition. Rugs should be put in all places where the worst wear comes on floor.—Woman's World for May.

Painter of Royalty.

Although Sir Luke Fildes has won many honours as the portrait painter of kings and queens, his latest portrait of King George is voted one of his best, and is attracting a great deal of attention at Burlington House. The picture on which his most lasting fame will rest is of course "The Doctor," with its wonderful intensity of human interest. Sir Luke is now sixty-eight years old, and has been a Royal Academician for twenty-five years. He has always been a favorite painter of royalty, and made a state portrait of King Edward in 1902. He first gained reputation as a painter of English and Venetian subjects, then turned his attention to portraits. His first picture, "Fair, Quiet, and Sweet Rest," was exhibited at the Academy forty years ago. His friendship with Charles Dickens had great influence on the development of his career. In the autumn of 1868 Dickens began his unfinished novel, "The Mystery of Edwin Drood." From sketches which had been appearing in the press Dickens decided that young Fildes was the man to do the illustrations for it, and curiously enough, Mr. Fildes had the solution of the story from the lips of the author himself. The artist had represented Jasper wearing a little black necktie, but Dickens said, "I must have a double necktie; it is most important, for Jasper strangles Edwin with it."

20 Scotch Lassies Held up in New York.

Boston, April 10.—Twenty girls, cabin passengers, all from Scotland, became brides upon the arrival of the s.s. Parian yesterday. Disappointed when the immigration officials held them up, the girls pleaded to be allowed to land, but the law governing such cases is inexorable. The young men had come prepared to have the marriages performed on the pier, as they brought their brides with them and were taken on board where everything was satisfactorily arranged.
 In each instance the young people had become engaged in Scotland and the coming of the girls was in accordance with an agreement made at betrothal.

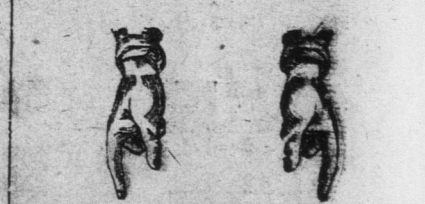

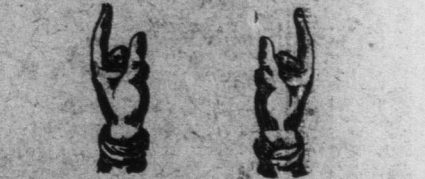
