LONDON, To-day.
Mary Bloomfield, daughter of Lady Bloomfield, widow of Sir Arthur Bloomfield, was the woman who created the sensational scene in Buckingham Palace last night, when she threw herself on her knees before King George and Queen Mary, exclaiming, "Your Majesty, for God's sake, do not use force." Miss Bloomfield, alone, was concerned in the incident, although her sister also attending court was requested to leave the Palace after the occurrence, despite the fact she took no part in the demonstration. She left without making any protest. An eyewitness in the immediate vicinity at the time declares the whole scene lasted less than ten seconds. King George was the coolest man in the company. The presentations proceeded after the incident with clock-work regularity.

BELFAST, To-day.
The Armoury of the Ulster Volunteers was strengthened to-day by the addition of 3,000 Mauser Rifles, the result of a daring gun running feat of an Irish yachtsman. A portion of the consignment were landed at South Donaghadee, 16 miles from Belfast, but most of the rifles were delivered straight on the quay of Belfast. The cases were removed under the eyes of the police by specially selected volunteers.
