As long as we live, or at least as long as we progress, there must be different minds among different men. The opposition we encounter to such opinions as we hold, tends to clarify our own minds regarding them. It is the crucible in which they are put to test, in which their strength and their weakness is revealed. That which seems right to us may be woefully wrong; our hope if something better to-morrow, may well lie in those who disagree with us.

Discussing the War.

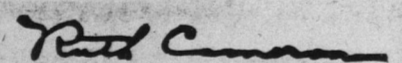

Between you and your closest friends there is inevitably a difference of bringing up. Between you and your husband there is the impassable chasm of the sexes. These are inevitable; the wise man is he who faces the inevitable and makes the best, not the worst of these differences.

If you must disagree—and disagree you must—resolve that you will have a "quiet, sympathetic disagreement." To disagree violently is to achieve nothing and to lose much. In any event, it is not nearly so important that you influence the other fellow, as it is that you maintain your influence with your self—the only influence compatible with poise and dignity; that which keeps you from anything but "quiet, friendly, sympathetic disagreement."

Sweden Explains Copper Shipment

London, Jan. 7.—The Swedish Legation yesterday issued a statement concerning copper imports to Sweden, which purports to show an increase of 4,794,623 pounds over 1913. It points out, however, that this increase, 1,379,534 pounds were imported since the war started. This was entirely due to growing domestic consumption, to which the electrification of the state railways and the needs of the army, largely contributed.

The statement also says that in recent years, Sweden's importation of copper has been steadily increasing, at the rate of about twenty per cent yearly.

The statement says the much talked of increase in importations of copper from the United States can be attributed to the fact that no copper is now obtainable from Germany, from which country considerable quantities were imported, before the war. With the export of copper from Great Britain, virtually prohibited, only the United States is left to supply Sweden with the metal.

Dying Mother Had Wish

London, Jan. 8.—The Daily Chronicle says Lord Kitchener is so generally credited with an iron character, devoid of sentiment in matters affecting his great purpose, that the following story of his thoughtfulness is of special interest.

A Sunderland woman with five sons in the army lay dying. Her one desire was to see her boys again. Through the officers of the local Salvation Army four of the sons serving England reached home in 24 hours, their expenses being paid by the authorities. The fifth son, however, was at the front and there seemed little chance of the old woman's wish being fulfilled. But the Salvationist wired to the war office, and back came a reply over Lord Kitchener's signature, saying that if the son could be found he would be sent home. A week later came a wire to say the man was on his way home, and eventually he landed in time to see his mother, and gave him a seven days' furlough and ratten money.

Market Encouraging.

Appended is a copy of a letter received by the Board of Trade yesterday from Lind & Conno, of Oporto: "After several weeks of good demand, principally for the cheaper grades of fish, the demand this week has diminished and we do not think there will be much sold before Christmas as the Christmas demand is generally over about Dec. 15th. There has been a short supply of Christmas qualities this year but on the other hand, the demand for expensive fish has been considerably less. Supplies from both Newfoundland and Norway will probably be coming forward freely in the near future and we hope it will all be needed but is a very uncertain and often disappointing month and it is impossible to form an idea of the demand. We estimate the present stocks at about 6650 qtls. of 60 kilos British and 1450 qtls. of Norwegian. The weather has been very stormy and there is a slight flood in the river."

RECEIPT FOR MAKING GOOD BREAD.

Take 1 quart of VICTORY flour, 1-3 cake Royal Yeast, dissolve in one cup luke warm water, pour this on flour with enough warm water to make stiff batter; in four hours this will be ready for mixing, then add 2 quarts VICTORY Flour and 2 dessert spoons table salt, and 1 pint luke warm water, knead ten minutes, then let rise over night, mould into loaves, let rise until double its bulk and bake for one hour. GERMAN CRUISER KOENIG REPORTED SUNK.

LONDON, Jan. 11.—The German cruiser Koening, which was bottled up in a cove on the coast of Africa several days ago, has been sunk, according to dispatch received from the Royal Navy.

PARIS, Jan.

Deliberate preparations have been completed to guard Paris against possible raids by Germany's Zeppelins. Minister of War Millerand has ordered the Military and General Staffs, Military Governor of Paris, visited to-day the trenches protecting the city and other means of defense against Zeppelins. They declared themselves wholly satisfied with what they considered the efficiency of the guns as well as of the defensive works.

ITALIAN FLEET SAILS.

ROME, Jan. 11.—Five Italian warships and a number of torpedo-boat destroyers were sent from Taranò at seven o'clock on the evening of Jan. 10 to the limit of the ultimatum to Turkey. The warships sailed in sealed orders, but it is rumored a Marine Ministry that they are their way to Hodeida, the Arab port where Fallières, Military and General Staffs, visited to-day the Italian flag, and precipitate crisis that is expected to bring into the war.
