WASHINGTON, To-day. Former Secretary of State, Bryan, who resigned his portfolio rather than sign the second note to Germany, issued another statement on Saturday, declaring the note materially revised, following the presentation of his resignation. It is true, said Bry his resignation. It is true, said Bryan, that I saw the final draft of the note just before my resignation took effect, and it contained an important change. I had no knowledge of this change at the time my resignation was tendered and accepted. This change, while very much softening the note, was not sufficient in my judgment, to justify me asking permission to withdraw my resignation. "What was the change in the note?" Bryan was asked. "I cannot discuss that," he replied. It was suggested the clause added to the note was that saying the States would entertain any evidence. BERLIN PAPERS COMMENT ON THE AMERICAN NOTE.

The Berlin papers generally comment more or less extendedly on the American note. While there is a general disposition to recognize the friendly tone of the Note and the fact that it makes further negotiations possible, the press is divided into two parties, one of which appears to be disposed to enter into negotiations, looking to a compromise on a new basis, while the other by implication or expressly rejects any departure or expressly rejects any departure from the course heretofore followed. Among representatives of the latter idea is the Taglieche Rundschau, which declares while the Note seeks which declares while the Note seeks a way to compromise, it seeks it along lines which must result in disadvantage to Germany. The Morgenposts says the Note is filled with tones of heartiness and friendliness, and seeks to open a smooth way for further negotiations. The offer to mediate between Germany and Britain will untuestionably be accepted by the German Government, and if mediation fails, it will be Britain's fault. The Zeitung finds the arguments contained in the American Note quite unconvincing.
