Some people can afford to wear a suit three or four years, but she has been to Europe and seen the most worthwhile things in this country. She can't afford to give her child a Fair Chance. Some people can afford jewelry. I know a woman who is bringing up her tiny little boy in a tiny apartment six stories up. Its one bedroom looks out on an air-shaft. She says she can't afford to move to a larger apartment in a more open neighbourhood. Yet she can afford two or three very handsome diamond rings. "COMBING OUT" IN THE ARMY
The "Combing-out" process spread not only to the War Office, but to branches of the service itself. Included among the air mechanics, the Royal Flying Corps are scores of shorthand-typists, and a very large number of these are now employed at Adestral House, the headquarters of the arm, which up to recently used as a hotel on the Thames bankment. It has just been decided that by November 14 all air mechanics under 25 years of age are to be discharged from Adestral House to some other home or abroad, where war clerks cannot be procured, while the end of the month all under 30 to be sent away. These men drawn from classes not fit for general service, but it is felt that more can be made of these than at present. It can scarcely be that the process will be confined to one section of a single Government department, and, therefore, it was seen that a sewer in the House of Commons recently to an identical question to Home Secretary and the President of the Board of Trade suggesting the lease for military service of all up to the age of 25 employed under their authority and their placement by discharged soldiers civilians over 42.

COLDS PREFERRED.

The wet and wintry weather, with its experience in London just now, is cruelly testing women outdoor workers, particularly the omnibus-tram conductresses, and on at least the amount of illness in the employers to decide upon a stoppage of work for all female employees during the rough weather. "It is only that women are unable to the rigours of the weather so the men," a tramway manager said to-day, "but they so seldom take advantage of the protection of their coats. It is intensely difficult for our young women to wear the clothes which are placed at their disposal. I believe they are rather catch a cold than look up to they call it."
