Kills His Bride of Three Months.

NEWBICK, N.S., March 16.—Henry F.
 Flint, a prominent business man of
 this town, to-day shot his bride of
 three months, calmly informing an
 undertaker that his wife was dead.
 He shot himself dead. It was
 one of the most tragic murders in the
 history of Maine.
 Nobody knows what his motive was.
 He disappeared a few days ago and re-
 appeared to-day. One of his first acts
 on his arrival was kissing his wife.
 A few minutes after he kissed and em-
 braced his wife he shot her dead. He
 had a .38 calibre revolver. He fired
 the shot into the body of his wife
 where he shot himself. Five empty
 shells were found by the police. The
 witnesses say they had a domestic
 quarrel. Then Flint whipped a re-
 volver from his pocket and fired four
 shots into the body of his wife. One
 struck her heart. Then he asked a
 small boy "for God's sake get an
 undertaker for her." The boy did not
 know what had happened and boy-
 hood just simply stood and stared at
 the murderer.
 Flint rushed into the undertaker's
 shop of Fred A. Spencer and told Mr.
 Spencer he had just killed his wife
 and please hurry up to his house.
 Mr. Spencer, who is a constable here,
 once started for the Flint home.
 When he arrived Flint had turned his
 revolver on himself and fired one
 shot which killed him.

Man's Best Age.

It may not be generally known that
 the best time of good health be-
 comes thirty-five and fifty-five. In the
