DOES NOT MEAN RUPTURE.

PARIS, April 25.
Newspapers are unanimous in the opinion that the departure of Orlando from Paris does not constitute rupture in relations.

PROTECTADE CONTINUES.

LONDON, April 25.
The note, recognising a British protectorate in Egypt, was communicated on Tuesday to General Allenby by the United States Consul General at Cairo.

FRENCH PRELATES APPOINTED.

PARIS, April 25.
An official announcement was made to-day of the nomination by President Poincaré of two French Bishops to succeed German Bishops at Strassburg and Metz.

LABOR LEADERS' PRAISE.

LONDON, April 24.
British Labor leaders have wired Wilson, congratulating him "on your magnificent declaration for peace based on fourteen points" adding, "certain Italian workers will associate themselves with international workers in supporting you."

BEYOND EXPECTATION.

PARIS, April 25.
Reconsideration of Polish aspirations relative to Danzig, has resulted in a decision concerning the future status of that city, which goes considerably further towards satisfying its demands than was contemplated some time ago.

PRESS OPINION DIVIDED.

LONDON, April 25.
The peace conference crisis continues the paramount topic of comment in the London newspapers, and the support given to Wilson's and Orlando's views, respectively, is about evenly divided, but with few excep-

tions, opinions are expressed cautiously and with a manifest desire to show friendliness for both Italy and Wilson, and to avoid saying anything likely to hinder the speedy restoration of harmony.

ORLANDO GOES HOME.

PARIS, April 24.
Premier Orlando left Paris for Rome at 8.30 to-night, accompanied by Barzilai, General Diaz and two other members of the Italian Mission.

MORE PRAISE FOR CANADIANS.

LONDON, April 24.
(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—The officers of the Second Canadian Division, which recently came from France, and are now at Witley Camp, awaiting to return to Canada, dined at the Savoy Hotel last night, and entertained among other guests, Lt. General Sir Arthur Currie and Lt. General Sir Richard Turner. Major Burnell, commanding the 2nd Division, presided, and read a letter from the Duke of Connaught expressing regret that it was impossible for him to attend the gathering, as he was unable to be in London. General Sir Julian Byng, who also wrote regretting his inability to be present, said that the plans laid by General Currie, with the assistance of his staff, had led the troops to one glorious success after another with a minimum of casualties.

The corps, he wrote, had always gone forward confident that the plan of their commander could have only one result. It was their unanimous hope that the influence, which General Currie had exercised during their service in the field, would be available to mould the destinies of the present and future manhood of Canada. General Currie, replying, said he had recently revisited the scenes of all the more important operations of the Canadian Corps. He recalled details of some of the fighting in which they had participated, including that at Vimy, Ypres, Amiens, Cambrai and Arras, the breaking of the Hindenburg line, and the capture of Mons. Now that the corps was about to break

up, he urged that all who had served in it should remember and continue to act up on its motto.

AIR FORCE RECORD.

LONDON, April 24.
(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—The Air Minister has published an astonishing record of the work of the air force during the war. It states that before the war, the air force consisted of 272 machines, 197 officers and 1,647 men, while in October 1918, there were 22,171 machines, 27,906 officers and 263,842 men. From July, 1916 to the armistice, the air force on the western front brought down 7,054 enemy air craft, dropped 6,042 tons of bombs, and fired over ten and a half million rounds at ground targets.

New Steamship Service

TO COMPETE WITH REIDS.
A well-founded rumour is current to the effect that Farquhar and company will come to the rescue of travellers and merchants and install a steamship service between North Sydney and Newfoundland. Although such a volume of business as was carried on between the latter place and outside points last year is not likely to be repeated this season, the present service as furnished by the Reid-Newfoundland company is entirely too inadequate, should the enterprising local concern place a fleet of steamers on the route between here and Newfoundland, there is no doubt but it would pay.—North Sydney Herald.

An Elephant in the Witness Box.

On July 18th, 1879, an elephant was brought into court as a witness. The action arose out of the visit of a lady to the Alexandra Palace, where a Nubian encampment was attracting crowds of people.

She went there in a pony-carriage, and after the conclusion of the performance a baby elephant came out, with its keeper, and frightened the pony. The pony bolted, and the plaintiff was thrown out and injured. Counsel for the defence said that the elephant was willing to go into the witness-box to show its harmless disposition; and, the judge consenting, the animal walked in, with bells on its head, and threaded its way through the mazes of the law as though it had been used to courts of justice all its life.

Counsel for defence having no questions to ask in cross-examination, the animal withdrew, and, the action being settled upon terms, the judge remarked that the happy ending was highly proper, since the elephant had come to offer its apologies in person.
