

## Caillaux Receives Prison Sentence.

### Ex-French Premier Found Guilty of Dealing With Enemy -- Red Light Proprietors in Bridgeport Import Gunmen-- "Pussyfoot" Johnson Back From England -- Germans Not Permitted to Attend Council at San Remo -- Many Marine Disasters Reported.

#### NO SIGNALS YET.

GEMAR RANCH, Cedar Creek, Neb., April 22. An effort early to-day to catch signals from Mars failed. Dr. Illiter and Harvey Gamar, electrical experts, who made the attempt, announced they would try again to-night.

#### CAILLAUX SENTENCED TO-DAY.

PARIS, April 22. Joseph Caillaux, former Premier of France, was found guilty of having had commerce with the enemy by the High Court of the Senate. The Court adjourned until to-morrow afternoon when sentence will be read to Caillaux. The crime of which M. Caillaux was convicted is covered by article seventy-eight of the military code, which calls for sentence of banishment for a maximum of five years or a minimum of one year.

#### THE CAILLAUX TRIAL.

PARIS, April 22. The charges of high treason and intelligence with the enemy, against former Premier Joseph Caillaux, were eliminated by the High Court of the Senate to-day by a vote of 214 to 28. This eliminated the possibility of the death penalty being inflicted.

#### BACK TO WORK.

CHICAGO, April 22. The next move of insurgent railroad strikers in Chicago District, split by revolt against their own leaders, was awaited to-day by Federal officials and railroad representatives, while traffic conditions throughout the Middle and Far West returned to normal. Several "rebel" leaders, repudiated yesterday by the strikers, when at a mass meeting they counselled ending the walkout because they could not fight the Government, abandoned the strike and led small groups of switchmen back to work.

#### "OUTLAWS" IN COUNCIL.

NEW YORK, April 22. With all overtures their behalf for

hundred and fifty private detectives that were brought here last Saturday by Mayor Wilson to conduct raids on vice resorts. Myers said that he had been warned that six gunmen had been sent from Philadelphia on behalf of the vice ring in Bridgeport and that plans had been made to threaten the life of Mayor Wilson and himself.

#### PUSSYFOOT HOME.

NEW YORK, April 22. William (Pussyfoot) Johnson, of Westerville, Ohio, returned here to-day from Liverpool on the steamer New York, after literally having given an eye to make England dry. The crusading agent of the American anti-Saloon League was met by a host of prohibition advocates.

#### SAN REMO STATEMENT.

SAN REMO, April 22. An official statement issued by the Supreme Council at the close of the morning session says: "The Supreme Council assembled at eleven a.m. this morning and heard the opinion of military and naval experts on the question regarding the administration of the Dardanelles Straits. The Council approved of the insertion of clauses relating to this matter in the Turkish Peace Treaty. The Council afterwards examined the present situation in the Caucasus."

#### TOWNSEND FOR TORONTO.

NEW YORK, April 22. It was announced here to-night that General Sir Charles Townsend, hero of Kut will visit Toronto on May 3rd and will probably accept an invitation to deliver an address in that city. Details of arrangements for his brief visit to Canada have not yet been worked out. The famous British General was entertained at luncheon at the Canadian Club to-day by a number of prominent Canadian residents here.

#### "FERDONIAN" MISSING.

BOSTON, April 22. The coast guard officers endeavoured to-day to locate the French steamer Ferdonian, which has not been heard from since she reported by wireless that she was disabled by engine trouble. The Ferdonian reported that she was then in the vicinity of George's Bank, which is approximately one hundred miles off Cape Cod. It is supposed that her wireless went out of commission after disabled call came in, as efforts to communicate with her have been unsuccessful. The coast guard cutter Osipee was ordered to proceed to-day in search of her. The Ferdonian left New York on April 15th for Halifax.

#### COAST CUTTER LOST.

BOSTON, April 22. The coast guard cutter Acushnet, which has been searching for the disabled steamer William O'Brien, reported early to-day by wireless that she had found the sea covered with fuel oil and the name board of the steamer drifting about five hundred miles east of New York. An empty life boat from the William O'Brien was picked up on Tuesday in the same locality. It is feared that the steamer went down not long after she had asked for assistance during the gale on Sunday.

#### House of Assembly.

The House met at 3.30 p.m. Mr. Sullivan presented a petition from the inhabitants of Rushcon, P.B., asking that that place be made a port of call for the S.S. Argyle. The petition was supported by Messrs. Walsh, Sinnott, Foote, and Cheeseman. Mr. Sullivan also presented a petition from Haystack, P.B., asking for a breakwater. Messrs. Walsh and Sinnott supported same. The Hon. Minister of Justice presented a petition from the Executive of the Women's Patriotic Association asking for a charter of incorporation. This was supported by Messrs. Sullivan, Small, LeGrow and the Prime Minister. Mr. Small presented the address in reply. Sir Michael Cashin asked that it be held over for further discussion until to-day.
