## Little Progress in Minsk Negotiations.

### Transfer Has Now Been Made to Riga---Ireland, North And South, in a Seeth--Egypt's New Status May Satisfy All Parties--- Lord Mayor of Cork Dying in Prison--New York Longshoremen Refuse to Work British Steamers.

#### PEACE NEGOTIATIONS.

**WARSAW, Aug. 29.**—The Russian Soviet Government has accepted Polish proposals for the transfer of Russia-Polish peace negotiations from Minsk to Riga, Latvia. It was announced in a Moscow wireless message which the Polish Government received early to-day. Definite indications reached Warsaw on Saturday that but little progress had been made at the Minsk Conference and that the Poles and Soviet representatives agreed to shift negotiations in the hope of bettering conditions generally.

#### REPRISALS AT QUEENSTOWN.

**LONDON, Aug. 28.**—Cameron Highlander troops invaded stores and dwellings of Sinn Feiners at Queenstown last night, as reprisal for an attack made on them on Thursday. Much damage was done and serious rioting resulted. Reports reaching here declare that street fighting is still going on.

#### DISCIPLINE PREVAILS.

**LONDON, Aug. 29.**—The Cameron Highlander troops, stationed at Queenstown, who broke quarters on Friday night and invaded stores and dwellings of Sinn Feiners there were induced by their superior officers about midnight to return to their tents, according to reports reaching here Saturday. These reports stated that all shop windows in the principal streets were smashed and there was much other damage.

#### CIVIL WAR AT BELFAST.

**BELFAST, Aug. 29.**—Belfast's Saturday night was the worst since what is popularly known as the battle of Kashmir Road. Six persons were killed and nearly forty wounded, many of them seriously. All the killed were young men, victims of gunshot wounds. Ballymacarret suburb of Belfast responded to the Lord Mayor's appeal and remained fairly quiet, but on Saturday afternoon Cuttingtree Road abutting Grosvenor Road. In the Unionist district, and from which side streets radiate to the Falls, became the storm centre. Later in the evening the battle shifted to the northern part of the city by way of Townsend St. a long thoroughfare extending from the falls to Old Lodge Road. The latter and the upper parts of Crumlin and Old Park Roads were centres of the fiercest fighting of the whole week, especially "Marrows" the nickname of the Nationalist enclave at the top of the Old Park Road.

Sinn Feiners in this neighborhood made an organized descent on the Unionists in Crumlin Road, smashing windows and firing into houses. Failure by the police to hold them back led to the summoning of military aid. For several hours armored cars were in action together with squads of police and soldiers, and volleys were poured into the crowd. After 2 hours of stiff fighting the Sinn Feiners were driven back into their own quarters, but sniping into Unionist quarters continued far into Sunday morning.

#### THE EGYPTIAN ARRANGEMENT.

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.**—The proposed new relationship between Great Britain and Egypt was described here yesterday as relatively the same as that existing between the United States and Cuba.

#### BANDIT'S VICTIMS ESCAPE.

**MEXICO CITY, Aug. 28.**—British and United States subjects who were captured by Pedro Zamora at Cuale are reported to have escaped.

#### MACSWEENEY DYING.

**LONDON, Aug. 29.**—The condition of Terence MacSweeney, Lord Mayor of Cork, who is in Brixton jail on hunger strike, was officially stated to-day to be virtually unchanged. His sister who visited him this morning said he passed a restless night and was sinking, and the doctors thought he might die at any moment. Mayor MacSweeney was still conscious however, and told her "I am convinced I will not be released. It will be better for my country if I am not."

#### WEST OF KOLNO.

**WARSAW, Aug. 28.**—Part of the third Russian cavalry corps and a detachment of infantry are still west of Kolno, according to latest reports.

#### BOLSHEVISTS INTERNED.

**LONDON, Aug. 28.**—Only thirty-four thousand Bolshevik soldiers have entered East Prussia and been interned, according to a despatch from Berlin.

#### GREEKS CONCENTRATING.

**SMYRNA, Aug. 28.**—The Greeks are concentrating their force in preparation for a new offensive the object of which is said to be Ushak.

#### WOMEN AGITATORS.

**NEW YORK, Aug. 28.**—Hostilities were resumed to-day by

the Sinn Fein women who yesterday started a demonstration, resulting in a walkout of more than two thousand Longshoremen, employed on the British ocean liners as a protest against Britain's Irish policy.

#### TO DINE GEDDES.

**OTTAWA, Aug. 28.**—The Government of Canada will tender a complimentary dinner to Sir Auckland Geddes, British Ambassador to Washington, when he visits Ottawa next Wednesday.

#### Germany Aids Soviets.

**London, Aug. 24.**—(Associated Press.)—Germany has shipped supplies and ammunition to Soviet Russia, according to a correspondent of the London Times who insists that Leon Trotsky, Russian Bolshevik Minister of War, visited East Prussia, in spite of official denials of reports to that effect from Moscow.

"The retreat of the Bolshevik armies from the gates of Warsaw," declares the correspondent, "may be explained by the fact that they lacked ammunition. Trotsky foresaw the need of the armies during the frantic effort made to capture the Polish capital, and made plans accordingly, but was too late. He crossed into Germany and reached an agreement with representatives of the German Government by which it would supply ammunition to the Bolsheviks."

"The ammunition has been paid for, in part, out of the Soviet 'jewel fund' which includes the Crown jewels. It was the intention of the Bolshevik to reserve this fund solely for propaganda purposes in the East, but Germany insisted upon cash payment. The second object of Trotsky's visit to East Prussia was to prevent munitions from reaching Poland, and to accomplish this object he employed Germans at Danzig with money from the same 'jewel fund.' A large traffic in arms took place between the Russians and Germans in the neighborhood of Soldau."

## Predict Big Wheat Crop in Australia.

**Rome, Aug. 23.**—(Associated Press)—Australia's wheat fields for the coming season are fifty per cent larger than in 1919, and weather and crop conditions were reported good as late as August 17, says a bulletin of the International Institute of Agriculture. During July the Indian monsoon was generally favorable and the price of wheat at Karachi is lower than at any date since July, 1918. Exportation of wheat from India, however, is still prohibited. The aggregate of wheat shipments from Argentina exceeded all estimates of available surplus during 1920, the bulletin says.

#### Prince of Wales.

**SUVA, F.M.I., Aug. 23.**—H.M.S. Renown sailed from here this morning for Honolulu with H.R.H. the Prince of Wales on board. The great battleship arrived yesterday. The Prince was given a very hearty reception and enjoyed a brief visit ashore.

**SYDNEY, Aug. 23.**—(Star Special Cable.)—The Prince of Wales, on sailing for England, carries all Australians in his pocket. He has repeated here the same stunt that he did in Canada, when in this far-flung continent there was some uncertainty about its future connection with the British Empire.

Excepting the railroad strike in New Zealand, the Prince met a super-generous treatment everywhere, even radical Queensland outdoing itself. Statesmen, laborers, sheep herders and thousands of soldiers cheered the "Digger Prince." He has proven himself the most valuable asset of the Empire, cementing the cracks in the Dominion's alliances. The "Smiling Prince's" visit has added a human touch to relations with the overseas Dominions. To those Australians who view the British connection dispassionately, recognizing the Empire for protection only, the Prince revived the personal connection.

#### Sinn Fein Finances.

There does not appear to be anything sensational in the Sinn Fein documents captured by the police. By them De Valera is authorized to spend half a million dollars in the election campaign for the Presidency of the United States; and another million dollars to secure the recognition of the Irish Republic by the United States Government. The money was raised by De Valera in the United States, and these resolutions are merely a formal authorization to him to spend it there. He certainly gave his subscribers some amusement for their expenditure. He tried both Republican and Democratic parties, and he failed to get an Irish plank into the platform of either. And he got into a dispute with the American Irish, who want all the money subscribed spent in the United States.—Westminster Gazette.

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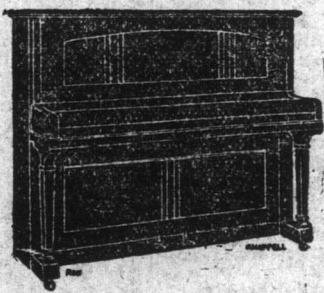
