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





LETTER FROM EARL HAIG. A letter was read from Lord Haig. President British Empire Service League, addressed to all Dominion Presidents of Veterans' Associations throughout the Empire, asking that a representative from each Dominion be appointed to act with him on the Executive of the British Empire Service League in London. Captain E. J. Fox, who is now residing in London, was unanimously elected to be the representative of the G.W.V.A. of Newfound land

THE REGIMENTAL COLORS. The matter of Regimental Colors then came up for discussion. It was moved and unanimously carried: "That a vote of thanks be extended

to the representatives of the G.W.V. A., who conveyed to His Excellency the Governor the protest against depositing the Renewal Regimental Colors in the Legislative Council Cham-

"That this meeting confirm the attitude of the deputation that the disposition of the colors be left in the hands of the G.W.V.A.

"That as the deputation to His Excellency the Governor had decided that all colors should be placed in the Government House, under the custody of the Governor, until such time time as a permanent place could be arranged, this meeting confirm this decision as to their disposal."
