**Warships Sacrificed to  
Assure Better Warships.**

LONDON.—Having found no buyers for the great group of battleships which the Washington conference decreed should be scrapped, Great Britain is using the monsters as targets for the gunners of the Royal Navy and the members of the Royal Air Force. Like the United States and France, this country has a dozen or more specially fine cruisers and one-time dreadnoughts which must be relegated to the ignominious junk pile. Thunderer, Monarch, Conqueror, Colossus, Lion, Ajax, Centurion, King George V., Princess Royal, Erin and Orion, monsters of 20,000 or more tons, once the pride of the Seven Seas, are all doomed. Costing more than \$15,000,000 originally, junk dealers have offered the government only \$20,000 apiece for them. The navy is now engaged in a series of target tests on the famous battleships Agamemnon and Superb, which, like their sister ships, are to find their graves in the ocean at the hands of the gunners and jack tars that once manned them. The admiralty is trying by these tests to determine how a direct hit can be prevented from passing from the turret down the ammunition tube.

**EXPLOSION PRACTICE.**

In the battle of Jutland, Invincible, Indefatigable and Queen Mary blew up because of a flash passing from the ammunition tube to the magazines below. So Superb is now in the English Channel and is being shelled at punishing ranges to see whether or not the flash of explosion passes down to the powder and shell magazines under given conditions. Agamemnon, too, may soon need a successor. She is a moving target, more difficult to hit than Superb, which is stationary. She is propelled by oil. The supply of oil is turned on, her engines are started, and the engineers flee from her before she gathers too much headway. Her speed as well as her steering apparatus are controlled by wireless in another ship. The most exciting part of these tests is that played by the sloop Snapper. She is responsible for taking accurate motion pictures of what happens to the target as the result of the shots. At times she runs the risk of being hit by the monster armor-piercing projectiles as well as being rammed by the 20,000 ton Agamemnon.

**Cowboy Baronet.****"A TERROR FOR MORMONS"—IN-  
TERESTING ENGAGEMENT.**

An interesting engagement announced is that of the Rev. Sir Gentile Cave-Brown-Cave, Bart, and Emma Julia, daughter of Sir Digby and Lady Pigott, of The Lodge, Sheringham, Norfolk.

The lady's father was Controller of the Stationery Office until 1905, and was knighted in 1906. He is one of our keenest ornithologists.

Sir Gentile is the celebrated "Cowboy Baronet," who, after a life of adventure in the Wild West, succeeded to the ancient family honour in 1907 on his father's death and took Holy Orders. He was ordained to the curacy of St. Andrew's, Walthamstow, in 1920. He was born on September 3, 1869.

The bride's mother is the daughter of the Hon. A. H. Macdonald-Moreton, Largs, Argyllshire.

Sir Gentile at one time held the title of champion roper of steers. He has seen service in the Navy and the British and American Armies. He fought in the Boer Rebellion, the second Burma War, the Spanish-American War, and as an R.G.A. gunner during the Great War; has been frozen in for four months in an Arctic expedition, and has punched cows in five American States.

He was "Kid Cave of Half Circle Ranch," breaking in wild horses at 22 each when his father died, and he succeeded to the title. He returned to England, found the family estate in Stretton-on-le-Feld, Leicestershire, worthless, owing to mortgages, and went back to America disappointed.

In 1910, it is said, he advertised in the New York papers for a wife stating that any woman under seventy would do if she would pay off the mortgages, but the title went begging.

It may be added that he is a "terror" for Mormons.—Glasgow Weekly Herald.

**Field Marshal Returns  
to the Whisky Business.**

LONDON.—Field Marshal Earl Haig has been elected a director of the Distillers' Company at the annual meeting held in Edinburgh. The chief product of the company is whisky. There are some people who think it rather detracts from the Field Marshal's dignity and reputation to be interested in a business of that sort, but their disapproval is hardly as vocal as it would be in America. The Haigs have long been financially interested in whisky. Earl Haig is usually credited with being thorough in all that he does, and he intends to be thorough in the whisky business. When he was asked to join the Board of Directors he connected, it was stated, "on the understanding that he would be no mere figure-head, but would take his full share of the work as well as of the responsibility attached to the office." He likes to have plenty to do. The Distillers' Company is planning to increase greatly its whisky output, both in Ireland as well as Scotland. It has acquired half the shares of the United Distillers of Belfast and expects soon to acquire the entire concern.

**Bank of England to  
Have Better Quarters.**

LONDON.—The long projected rebuilding of the Bank of England will start almost immediately, the Daily Express understands. A meeting of the Directors is to be held soon to make the necessary financial arrangements. It is understood that the plans to be adopted are those of Herbert Baker, the architect who collaborated with Sir Lutyens for the new capital at Delhi. Mr. Baker was also the designer of the South African government's administrative buildings at Pretoria, and of the cathedrals at Capetown, Pretoria and Salisbury (Rhodesia) and the Cecil Rhodes Memorial on Table Mountain. The staff of the Bank of England is now double what it was shortly before the war, largely owing to the vast growth of the National Debt, and the existing accommodations are utterly inadequate. Sections of the staff have been working for a long time at various places in the vicinity of the Bank.

**HISTORIC WALL.**

A special committee of the directors, including Cecil Lubbock, have been considering alternative schemes for the rebuilding. The idea of razing the whole of the existing one-story building to the ground, was it is understood, abandoned, partly on sentimental grounds and partly because of the difficulties of obtaining accommodation for the staff during the reconstruction. The present proposal is to retain the outer wall, which abuts on Threadneedle Street, St. St. Bartholomew's Lane, Lothbury and Princess Street. This wall, which entirely surrounds the site of the old bank, was erected from three and four acres, was erected from the designs of Sir John Seames about 1300 years ago, shortly after the Gordon Riots, when the bank clerks, sword and pistol in hand, defended the bank against a furious mob. The wall is in the classic Grecian style, and in some places is 40 feet high. Security demanded that it have no windows and the architect achieved the difficult task of making the wall look ornamental by masking it with Corinthian columns and blank windows. The new building will rise within the wall to a height of 70 or 80 feet above it, and will thus be nearly 120 feet in height.

**Deaf and Dumb Wed.**

A deaf and dumb wedding recently took place in the parish church of Beddington, Surrey, between Mr. James Lee, of Brighton, and Miss Emily Wilcott, of Beddington Corner. The bridegroom is deaf and dumb, the bride is deaf, and one of the bridesmaids is also deaf and dumb. The officiating clergyman was the Rev. H. A. Hodgson, the rector, and he was assisted by the Rev. E. B. James, missionary from the Royal Association in Aid of the Deaf and Dumb, who acted as interpreter.

But it is just as well to take the best tea with you, it doesn't cost much more. The last time we were out we had a splendid tea and it only cost us 65c. lb. It had a sort of artistic name—"Mount View." We bought it at Henry Blair's. They had another good tea there at 80c. per pound, but the clerk said "the best is the best," and we believe him.

Freshly boiled water is the secret of the cup of tea you drink out camping, fishing, berry picking or picnicking, but it is just as well to have the best tea. You can get it for 65c. per lb. at Blair's "Mount View," that is the slogan.
