Priest Who Failed to Stop

MAXIMUM PENALTIES FOR MOTORING OFFENCES.
The Rev. Father Cyril James Smith of St. Simon's Church, Putney, was by Shoreham fined the maximum penalty of £20 for driving a car to the danger of the public on the Worthing-Brighton road at Lancing on the night of August 24th, with a further fine of £10 (again the maximum) for failing to stop after the accident.
Evidence was given that the defendant knocked down and ran over a pedestrian, Mrs. Howard Rayner, who is still in a serious condition, and, despite the shout of the man's companions, drove on through Worthing, his car being eventually found in a field.
The defendant did not appear owing to ecclesiastical duties, but a plea of guilty was tendered on his behalf, with an explanation that he was unaware of the accident. The magistrate also directed his licence to be endorsed and suspended for twelve months.

Little Boy Was Scalded to Death

WINNIPEG, Oct. 12.—Placed in a hot bath at the home of the Good Shepherd, Donald Simpson, two and a half years old, was fatally scalded on Sunday. The youngster died in the hospital after several hours of great agony.
A maid at the home had charge of the baby and had prepared the bath, but states she did not know the water was dangerously hot. Authorities have commenced an investigation.

HEAVY LOSS DUE TO THEFT OF PIECE OF CLOTH.
A piece of cloth about two yards square, whose loss will mean thousands of pounds to the owners but whose value is only a few shillings, has been stolen from a large mill in Bramley, Leeds.
The cloth was in a roll-top desk, which was burst open. The piece had woven in it about a dozen of next year's patterns, and was to be shown to the London merchants.
Nine months' work had gone into the designing and weaving of the cloth.


