Cholera in Germany. Imperialists at Chislehurst. Affairs in Spain. 80,000 Reserves to be Called into Active Service.

London, Aug. 15.—M. Romber and a number of other prominent French Imperialists are at Chislehurst celebrating a fete.

Cholera is increasing in violence at various places in Germany. Madrid, Aug. 15.—One thousand insurgent refugees from Valencia have landed on the coast of Alicante.

Portugal, in which country they hope to find sympathizers with their movement. New York, Aug. 16.—The Herald's cable special from Ozebuirne and Pampeluna says:—We are marching with Generals Ellis and Dorregaray.

Yesterday we passed within sight of Pampeluna. No attempt was made to molest us. Three hours later we took Fort Bourgette, which was abandoned by its garrison.

A Herald's cable despatch, dated London 15, says the Vienna correspondent telegraphs that the prizes will be awarded by the Commissioners on Tuesday next.

Washington, D.C., Aug. 15.—The President has issued a proclamation for the purpose of celebrating the centennial of the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

Madrid, Aug. 15.—Five British, Italian and an American men-of-war were lying in Escombera Bay on Thursday.

It is reported that the crew of the British steamer Deerhound, lately seized by a Spanish man-of-war for landing arms for the Carlists are to be tried on a charge of piracy.

London, Aug. 15.—Six hundred French Imperialists are at Chislehurst to-day and celebrated the fete day of the late Emperor. Prince Louis Napoleon made a speech in the course of which he said:—Planting myself as an exile near the tomb of the Emperor, I represent his wishes, which may be summarized in the motto, "Govern for the people by the people."

BROTHER RASCALS.—A young man named Jno. Froesch was committed to goal at Berlin last week on a charge of stealing \$4 from the pocket of a vest belonging to Mr. Cyrus Erb, which was hanging up in the saw mill at Preston.

CHARGE OF GAUGE.—The 6th October is the day fixed for the commencement of the change of the gauge on the Grand Trunk Railway between Montreal and Stratford.
