OLD TIME RIVALS WORK TOGETHER TO TRAIN JEFF

Corbett and Choyinski in the Same Camp Recall Incidents in the Lives of the Two

San Francisco, May 12.—With Bob Armstrong helping to train Jim Jeff and with Billy Delaney likely to take charge of the Johnson camp, it was as though the color line is beginning to run, doesn't it? It certainly interferes with the belief that the coming fight is to be a "clash of titans." It looks indeed, as though the clash had occurred already and has left a magic effect upon the opposing ranks.

One of the most interesting things about Jeff's training is that Jim Corbett and Joe Choyinski are to be members of the big fellow's camp.

Imagine these old-time rivals

working in harmony for a common cause! The fact that they are to be principal second, and it is said that before the spectators were admitted to the famous Choyinski-Corbett battle, of twenty-one years ago, and many arguments regarding the way the fight was developed, ripened, had its climax and left Corbett master of the field.

There is no harm, I suppose, in telling the story in abbreviated form. Jim Corbett and Joe Choyinski were Hayes valley boys, and rivals in their school days. They had a scrap in the sand dunes, and Corbett, it was claimed, came out victor. The feud, did not end there, however. Both youngsters developed a penchant for pugilism, and in the course of time Jim Corbett became the boxing instructor of the Olympic club.

Choyinski was one of the star men of the California Athletic club, of which L. R. Fuld was president.

The two saplings were itching to go together, and when the talk of watching them came up it was a case of two hearts with but a single thought. The stake was \$1,000 a side, and the young heavyweights met the first time in a bare above Palfray, the date being May 20, 1889.

Jack Dempsey was Choyinski's use ordinary street gloves with the

round Sheriff Healy, of Martin county, was stopped. Corbett, who had far the better of the going, injured his

left thumb during the sparring, and heroic methods were resorted to to have Jim's crippled hand in shape by the date set for the resumption of hostilities.

The Fight on the Barge.
