THE "TIDAL WAVE" OVER THE

For the first time in its history the United States tried what is known as the Australian system of voting in the recent Congressional elections. The system is almost identical with the Canadian method of registering votes at elections, and our neighbors have been rather slow in completing their count. We are now enabled to see the full extent of the enormous change in public opinion, which has followed on the attempt of the Republicans to further increase the taxes of the people.

In 1881, it was \$6,317; in 1886, after London East was taken in, it rose to \$8,853; three year later in 1889, it was nearly double, or \$15,900; and this year, on the testimony of Ald. Boyd, who should be an electric expert by this time, it is \$17,400. What it will be when South London is lighted it is hard to tell, but most probably between \$20,000 and \$25,000 a year. 
