—A copy of the Tunbridge Wells (Eng-  
land) Courier has been received containing  
an account of the death of Mrs. Mount-  
ain, wife of Rev. James Mountain, of that place.  
Mr. and Mrs. Mountain are well known in  
London, the former having preached at the  
First Congregational Church for two  
months during the absence of Rev. H. D.  
Hunter, who was pastor at the time. Mrs.  
Mountain herself addressed a number of  
meetings and traveled not only in Canada,  
but in New Zealand, Australia, South  
Africa, as well as in the British Isles, where  
she and her husband addressed a large  
number of meetings. The end of Mrs.  
Mountain's useful career will be learned  
with regret by many Londoners.

—A few days ago the Mayor of London  
petitioned Parliament to give the bond-  
holders of the London and Port Stanley  
Railway the right to vote upon their bond-  
holders in the election of directors, etc. The  
city of London has a large block of bonds  
upon which no interest has been paid, and it  
is anxious to secure a controlling interest in  
the road. The petition of Manager  
Seagrave, of the Grand Trunk, against the  
application from London, has already been  
noticed here. The Mayor of St. Thomas  
also protests against the proposition from  
London. He says St. Thomas holds \$38,  
000 of London and Port Stanley bonds,  
but that in the opinion of the city it would  
not be advisable to take the control out of  
the hands of the shareholders.—(Toronto  
Mail's Ottawa Correspondence.)

inspection tour on June 10, when the mem-  
bers will pay official visits to the various  
seats of learning in an omnibus, drawn by a  
span of horses. Trustees Cook (chairman),  
Turner, Stephenson, Tanton and Secretary  
Abbott were present.

**Clever and Charitable.**  
Mrs. Moore's concert, given for the ben-  
efit of the Convalescent Home in Victoria  
Hall Thursday evening, was admirably suc-  
cessful. The house was packed with an attentive  
and well-pleased audience. The piano duet  
by Mrs. Moore and Miss Rogers, and the  
piano solo by Miss E. Raymond, in the  
song "A Nursery Story," showed herself  
the possessor of a very sweet voice, and  
Mrs. A. Gaud, the elocutionist of the  
evening, kept the house in a state of  
almost breathless attention during her  
artistic interpretation of "Lasca." The  
leading part in "Cinderella," the closing  
number, was admirably filled by Miss Clara  
Hutchinson, who rose easily and charming-  
ly to the musical requirements of the oc-  
casion. Perhaps the central figure of the  
evening was Mrs. E. B. Gordon, whose  
violin solo, "Gypsy Dance," wholly  
captivated the hearts of her audience and  
produced an enthusiastic encore. This  
evening's concert was a success in every  
way, and the proceeds will be a most valu-  
able aid to the cause of the convalescent  
home. On the whole, Mrs. Moore is to be  
congratulated on the musical treat she has  
given to the public.

**Rev. E. B. Lonsdaley on Prohibition.**  
Rev. E. B. Lonsdaley, of Colborne Street  
Methodist Church, this city, was one of the  
speakers at the Methodist Conference tem-  
perance anniversary in Windsor the other  
evening. He said he was grateful at the  
present outlook of the temperance question.  
It was widening and deepening every day.  
He referred to the evils of the traffic and  
the effect of the church and state toward it.  
All the families in the land were more or  
less injuriously affected by the drink traffic.  
He told some touching stories to emphasize  
this feature. He gave statistics showing  
that a large proportion of persons sent to  
our jails, penitentiaries and asylums were  
there as the result of drinking liquor. Nine  
hundred thousand persons had perished  
from the present Parliament asking for pro-  
hibition. He believed such a law was  
near at hand. He made a scathing  
reference to the Hon. Mr. Foster, a  
former temperance lecturer. "This hon-  
orable gentleman had now become the  
advocate of the liquor traffic. Shame on  
him!" he said, and the expression was re-  
peated with a shout. He believed with  
Gladstone that, while it was not the duty  
of Governments to make sober men and  
law-abiding citizens, it was the duty of Gov-  
ernments to make it as difficult as possible  
for people to do wrong and as easy as possible  
for them to do right. The greatest possible  
good to the greatest number was the under-  
lying principle of our laws. There are no  
individual rights. Everybody must give  
way to the general good. Seventy thousand  
persons on this continent were going down  
to thousands' graves of sorrow. The cry  
comes from the schools, the churches and  
the families to do away with this accursed  
traffic. Rev. J. E. Ford, of Westminster,  
and Rev. B. Clement, of Petrolia, also  
spoke ably on the subject.
