The Cockneys and Babes broke even yesterday at Tecumseh Park. Even so far as the score was concerned, but the honors were not quite equal. The tailenders won a clean victory in the morning, and the locals had to be content with a draw in the afternoon. Although the afternoon game was practically clinched by London before Chatham threw up the sponge, there was still a fighting chance for the Babes had they continued. A game never lost until the last man is out, and this glorious uncertainty of baseball might easily have been illustrated at that ninth inning, which did not materialize. A forfeited game causes all-round dissatisfaction, and it is time the Babes outgrow their pettishness, which has already brought about two such unsatisfactory terminations at Tecumseh Park this season.

The forbidding weather in the morning was responsible for a small attendance—about 500—and the rain-soaked grounds materially affected the article of ball put up by both teams. The attendance in the afternoon was nearly 1,500.

TAILENDERS WON.

After that only one tally was made by the Babes—Jones' home run in the fifth. Almost a triple play was made in the ninth, in this way: Conklin and McEwen each singled; Jones hit to Keenan, who touched Conklin on his way to third, and threw McEwen out at second. Mohler passed the ball on and gave Jones a close call at first. Meares' running one-hand catch of a fly off Reids' bat in the fifth was the prettiest catch of the season and the feature of the game.

London waited to hit Watkins, the ex-Bay City pitcher, who was in the box for the Babes, and did superb work throughout. A string of fielding errors gave the locals their three runs in the fifth. In this inning the visitors seemed hypnotized, Watkins alone keeping his head cool. He probably realized that the only way of retiring the side was by three strikes-out, and he rose to the occasion.
