LONDON, Aug. 14 .- A dispatch to the Times from Port Limon, Costa Rica, dated Aug. 12, says: The British cruiser Mohawk has arrived here from the Mosquito country with Chief Clarence and 112

refugees aboard. Bluefield was retaken by 2,000 Nicaraguans, who arrived from Rama and Greytown aboard transports flying the United States

flag. The American marines re-embarked on their approach, abandoning the American residents, many of whom removed the national flag from their houses and

hoisted the British flag. The Nicaraguan officials on entering the Government House hauled down and tore into shreds the Mosquito flag and arrested numerous Americans and Jamaicans suspected of sympathizing with Chief Clarence. Capt. Stewart, of the Mohawk, went into the prison and rescued those who were will-

ing to claim British protection. The Mohawk remains at Port Limon, awaiting orders from Great Britain. Chief Clarence is still aboard the Mohawk.

BIG FAMILIES IN QUEBEC.

Bounties Paid So Far to 1,742 Fathers of Twelve Children or More. Nearly 180,000 acres of rich agricultural land in the Province of Quebec has been given away in bounties for large families in the last four years by the Provincial Government. These bounties are regulated by law, and are paid at the rate of 100 acres of Government land for every family of twelve children. The ast governing the bounties was the creation of ex-Premier Mercier; was entitled "An act to confer a privilege upon fathers of families who have twelve children living," and contains the

following preamble: "Whereas, it is advisable, following the example of past centuries, to give marks of consideration for fruitfulness in the sacred and civil bonds of matrimony, therefore her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislature of Quebec,

enacts as follows." Then come the provisions of the bill. granting 100 acres of public lands to "every head of a family, whether he be born or naturalized in this province, who has twelve children living, issue of lawful marriage." In order to obtain the bounty the applicant must present a petition to the Provincial Secretary, accompanied by his certificate of marriage, a certificate of baptism of secretary, accompanied by his certificate sworn before a justice of the peace, giving the number and names of his children. Up to this date 1,742 fathers of twelve or more children have complied with the conditions of this act and received the State re-

ward. Not all of them, however, are satis fied with the amount of the bounty. Instances of families of twenty and more children are not rare, and the fathers of these usually look for a reward superior, proportionately, to that acceded those who barely come within the provisions of the act. By the same ordinances 20 francs were paid to every young man marrying at the age of 20 or under, and the same amount to every young woman marrying at

the age of 16 or under.
