# AN APPEAL TO THE WORLD

W. C. T. U. Wants Sale of Liquor to Soldiers and Aborigines Stopped-An International Movement.

Washington, Dec. 5 .- The Woman's Christian Temperance Union yesterday adopted resolutions against the army canteen, and prepared a petition to the president, another to congress, and identical petitions to all the great powers, against the sale of firearms and the importation of liquor and opium into the Philippine Islands or the island possessions of other powers addressed. The petition to the president pointed out that it had been the policy of America to forbid the sale of intoxicants to the Indian tribes, and that England, who had the greatest experience among all the colonizing powers of the world, had been forced to adopt a prohibition policy in her colonies in Africa and elsewhere. The convention, therefore, asked the president, either through the war department or the commission, to extend the prohibition law of the Indian so as to take in the Philippine Islands. A petition to the senate urges the rati fication of the pending treaty for the protection of Central Africa against A petition was also intoxication. drawn up to Great Britain, France. Spain, Holland, Belgium, Sweden and other foreign governments, asking for an international treaty that will forbid the sale of intoxicants, opium and firearms in all islands inhabited chief-

ly by aboriginal tribes. An inter-denominational movement to celebrate the beginning of the twentieth century by a systematic effort to evangelize the nation through the medium of existing churches and church societies, is in effect the motive of what is probably the most farreaching movement ever inaugurated. Every prominent religious society was represented. President Clark, of the International Christian Endeavor, Society, came from Boston to attend the conference in New York. Mrs. Margaret Bottome was there for the King's Daughters. The Baptist Young People's Union, the Epworth League, the Young Men's Christian Association, the Young Women's Christian Association, several reform societies, all had delegates, noted and representative, present, who were enthusiastic over the whole scheme. It is said that the dying hopes of the late evangelist, D. L. Moody, had something to do with suggesting the idea; but the scheme was first put into practical form William Phillips Hall. Nearly 500 delegates were assembled.

TO PURIFY NEW YORK. New York, Dec. 4 .- Scores of women were driven from their rooms in the "Red Light District" today. The exodus was the result of the move of the authorities against the landlords who own the tenements in which the women lived, and who in turn served the women with dispossession notices. The unfortunates got out of the city-some to Brooklyn, others to Jersey, while some are said to have gone to the larger eastern cities. Simultaneous with this effort to rid the city of vice in this form was the opening today of an industrial home for fallen women under the auspices of the Salva tion Army.

PEARSON'S SISTER SADIE.
