Hon. Mr. Dryden, minister of agricul-ture, has gone to Chicago to attend the Fat Stock Show being held in that city.

Woodstock ratepayers will vote on the question of incorporation as a city when the municipal elections take place.

Sir Charles and Lady Tupper will leave Vancouver for the east on Dec. 7. They will stop at Winnipeg till after Christmas.

The question of protecting the Wel-land Canal against attack from lawless characters is occupying the attention of the Dominion authorities.

The British Government is negotia-tion for large water lots and consider-able land in Sydney Harbor, Nova Scotia, evidently with a view of fortify-ing the harbor and using it as a naval depot.

The solicitor of Senator Fulford has filed his statement of claim in the ac-tion for alleged slander, against Hon. N. Clarke Wallace, on account of the allegation that the senator paid \$50,000 to the government for his title.

The Dominion live stock commis-sioner reports that as a result of a recent conference with railway officials at Montreal, the railways have made some considerable concessions in freight rates to the live stock men.

A warrant has been issued for the arrest of Mrs. Hazleton, wife of Joseph Hazleton, the Toronto druggist, now in custody on the charge of murdering Mrs. Martha Milne. The woman is charged with trying to spirit away witnesses.

Crown Timber Agent Hamilton, of Warren, Ont., says that more timber is being cut this year than ever be-fore. Lumbermen are complaining of the scarcity of labor. Shanty men are getting from \$25 to \$30 a month this season and their board, when two years ago their wages were \$14 and \$16.

So great has become the alarm of Toronto people at the reiterated state-ments that a bread trust was in pro-cess of formation in that city to con-trol the output, that George Weston, proprietor of a big bakery, has found it necessary to issue a statement, over his own hand, to the effect that the story is a dream.

KAISER'S COURSE.

William's Old Indiscretion in Congratulating the Boer Has Now Been Forgiven.

London, Dec. 5.—The English press continues to discuss Kruger's letter of dismissal from Berlin, but refrains from saying what is in everyone's mouth, namely, that the German emperor owed England this act of reparation for his indiscretion five years ago in telegraphing a letter of con-gratulation to Pretoria after the Jameson raid. It has been one of the commonest comments among English-

men that the expectation of European intervention inspired by that dispatch was one of the main causes of the South African war. The German em-poror has made full amends by throw-ing a bucket of cold water on Krug-er's mission. There are suspicious en-tertained in diplomatic circles that the French government baited Kruger with the suggestion that it would fol-low the lead of the German emperor, if he could be induced to intervene, but there is no direct proof of this theory.

DEWET'S FORCE GOT AWAY!

After an All-Day Engagement With Gen. Knox's Troops Near Bethulie.

How the Great Train-Wrecker Manages His Men—Burghers Kept in the Field by Force—Canadians Get a Good Reception at Portsmouth.

London, Dec. 4.—Gen. Kitchener re-ports from South Africa that the mounted troops of Gen. Knox were engaged all day long Sunday with part of Gen. Dewet's forces north of Bethulie. The Boers, he adds, were headed off, and retired in a north-easterly direction.

DEWET'S WAYS.
Durban, Dec. 5.—One of Commandant Dewet's late lieutenants, who was cap-tured, and is now on parole here, states that the great train-wrecker invari-ably entered the field with two loaded revolvers in his hands in order to overawe the reluctant burghers. At Tabanhu there was a regular stampede of men who had grown sick of the useless fighting, and it was not checked until Dewet turned a machine gun on the runaways. Dewet constantly swears that he will never sur-render. He has, he says, lost two sons killed in battle, his farm has been destroyed, and he has nothing to live for but fighting.

WANT TO SURRENDER.
According to Dewet's lieutenant the burghers are willing enough to sur-render, but they are terrified by the stories persistently circulated that the British shoot their prisoners at St. Helena.

Whenever the Boers retreat they in-variably bury their ammunition, and return and recover it later. Food, says the lieutenant, is now running low. There has been little else but fighting lately.

Dewet is alleged by his own of-ficer, has, wherever he has raided, visited every farm house on the road and called upon the males found therein to fight. Every case of re-fusal has been followed by the burn-ing down of the farm house.

The lieutenant confirms the reports that Dewet stambed some burghers near Kroomstadt when they re-fused to burn a captured mail train. He then fired the train with his own hands.

BOER BRIGADES
Durban, Natal, Dec. 5.—A small Boer commando appeared a few days ago near Ladysmith and looted a store. They then entered a farm house, where whose only adult occupant was a woman. She pluckily seized a revolver and attempted to prevent their en-trance, but she was speedily disar-med and knocked senseless, after which the Boers kicked her and robbed the house.

WANT MARTIAL LAW.
Cape Town, Dec. 5.—The feeling among the British here is that a proclamation should be issued declaring martial law in the disaffected districts of Cape Colony. This sentiment is growing steadily, especially in view of the Dutch convention at Worcester on Dec. 6.

At the request of the Colonial Gov-ernment the magistrate of Port Eliza-beth inspected the camp of the Boer exiles. His report is to the effect that the site is the most favorable one avail-able. The water supply is ample, and there is an unlimited quantity of food. The Boer women resent the idea of be-ing deported, but are satisfied with their treatment.

LORD ROBERTS.
Pietmaritzburg, Natal, Dec. 5.—Lord Roberts is expected here today on his way home. People who have seen him say he appears to be in perfect health. His arm is still in a sling, however, as a result of his fall from his horse in Johannesburg. At present he is visiting the battlefields at Colenso, on the Tugela, where Gen. Buller had such hard fighting.

Cape Town, Dec. 5.—Lord Roberts will arrive here from Durban on the transport Canada next Saturday or Sunday.

NURSES NEEDED.
Ottawa, Dec. 5.—Col. Pinaut, deputy minister of militia, called a few days ago to the high commissioner asking where the Canadian nurses who went to South Africa were. He has received a reply stating that Col. Otter said he had left them in Pretoria, and had no idea when they were to return home.

BRAVE TROOPER PICTON.
London, Dec. 5.—A Reuter dispatch from Harrismith says: "An instance of extraordinary courage by a trooper in Loch's Horse has been brought to the special notice of Gen. Hunter. A troop of Loch's Horse were recently put out on patrol with Col. Ross and Lieut. Williams, and somehow they rode into an ambush. Lieut. Williams was almost immediately killed, and Col. Ross dangerously wounded in the head. At this critical juncture Trooper Picton gallantly rushed up to the wall of the Kafir kraal, from which the enemy had opened fire, and discovered six Boers there. He immediately emptied his revolver, with such effect that three of the Boers fell dead, and the remainder forthwith laid down their arms and were taken prisoners. Trooper Picton, for his gallant action, has been recommended for the medal for distinguished service in the field. The wounds of Col. Ross are of a very serious character."

THE END (?)
James G. Stowe, United States consul-general at Cape Town, landed at Southampton yesterday. In an inter-view he said: "I give the war in South Africa four months to come to an end. In my opinion it is bound to be snuffed out during that period. I do not believe Lord Kitchener will do much more than any other general. The present plan of the British campaign is bound to bring about the result. More-over there are 16,000 Boer prisoners in Ceylon, St. Helena and at Cape Town—all of whom are anxious to have an end of hostilities."

Canadians at Portsmouth.
GET A HEARTY RECEPTION.
Portsmouth, Dec. 5.—This famous old town was visited yesterday by the members of the Canadian Regiment, on their way home from active service in South Africa. Portsmouth has had many occasions for jubilation, but the reception to the men from the empire's premier colony surpassed any demon-stration of recent years.

The mayor of the city welcomed the Canadians in a particularly happy speech, and in eloquent words praised them for their noble patriotism in coming forward to the aid of the em-pire.

Lieut. Col. Buchan, who was in charge of the regiment, replied, thank-ing the mayor for his kind words, and the citizens of Portsmouth for the heartiness of their reception.

The party, accompanied by a com-mittee of citizens, visited the dock-lands, and the men displayed great in-terest in the sights that met their eyes. The Canadians were received by the admiral of the port, who, in showing them over the yards, took them upon Lord Nelson's old flagship, the Vic-tory, and showed them the spot where the bell, which is now marked by a brass tablet, Close beside the Vic-tory was another three-decker, and this relic of naval warfare in Nelson's time was also inspected.

The men were entertained at luncheon while in Portsmouth, at the expense of the war office. They came down from London on a special train.

The Duke of Argyll gives a luncheon to the contingent at Kensington Palace today. Princess Louise arrived from Scotland. Lord and Lady Strathcona held a reception Saturday.

London, Dec. 3.—The members of the Royal Canadian Regiment returned to London last evening and visited various theaters, everywhere being heartily cheered.

SERGEANT JONES.
Dungannon, Ont., Dec. 4.—A pleasant event occurred here last evening, when the village was gallantly decorated to greet one of the returned soldiers, Sergt. Jones, from South Africa. A number of citizens met him at Carlow, where they were joined by the Auburn band, and came in procession home. In the evening a torchlight procession escorted Sergt. Jones to the D. P. A. Hall, where a large and enthusiastic audience awaited him. The programme consisted of choruses, recitations, fancy flag drills by little girls, short ad-dresses by the local clergy, several of-
