So with our own beloved McKinley, who had by his manliness and his honesty and his patriotism, and his true Christian character, so endeared himself to his countrymen, that when these two lives went out and the ties of affection were broken, their people walked in the deepest darkness and sorrow, while the nations of the earth lavished their sympathy upon the grief-stricken people of the English tongue. tions of the earth. I think we need not be told that the people of the world are being gradually led out of the darkness of the past ages into the twentieth century light of Christian civilization. ### THE BONINE TRIAL

Testimony for Defense Begun-15 Witnesses Testified for the Accused.

Washington, Dec. 3.—The defense in the case of Mrs. Lola Ida Bonine, charged with the murder of Jas. Seymour Ayres, yesterday placed fifteen witnesses on the stand. The purpose was to establish that Mrs. Bonine evinced no particular par-tiality toward Ayres, and that her conduct and bearing toward him differed in no respect from that displayed toward other guests at the hotel. William C. Hay, who, with his family,

lived at the Kenmore at the time of the tragedy, testified that the dances at the Kenmore were usually arranged by Mrs. Bonine, and that at these dances her bearing toward Ayres was nothing out of the ordinary. It had been her habit, he said, when the dancers were not prompt in their attendance, to go to their rooms and urge them to come down.

Mr. Hay stated on cross-examniation that he understood it had been Mrs. Bonine's intention to leave the hotel, but after the tragedy he had advised her that it would be inadvisable to do so until the

affair was clear up.
Richard L. Jenks testified that he heard Mrs. Bonine giving Ayres advice against drinking to excess.

George B. Gardner, assistant attorney in the interior department, to whom Mrs.

Bonine first told her story, and who was one of the government witnesses, testified that he had seen Mrs. Bonine and Ayres dancing together, and had observed nothing unusual in their conduct.

David C. Mooney said he had observed Mrs. Bonine dance with Ayres, but saw nothing in her attitude toward him differing from that toward others. Similar
