A Unique Seminary.

London, England, is the only city in the world which can boast the unique distinction of having an interdenominational theological seminary. To explain the mystery, it seems that the institution is composed of various confessions of faith, and the degree of doctrinal agreement is such that the faculty of the institution upon students who pass examinations in a curriculum of studies prepared by a board consisting of the theological staff of the seminary. Only those things are taught in the institution upon which all of the instructors have agreed, and the harmonies rather than the hostilities of religious thought are brought about.

Wm. A. Gilmour, a Vancouver barrister, and brother of Mr. Jack Gilmour, formerly of the Bank of Toronto here, died suddenly at Vancouver on Monday afternoon. He was 48 years of age, and had been in the city for some time. He was a member of the law firm of Gilmour, Smith, and Co., and was a prominent member of the bar. He was a native of Scotland, and had been in Canada for many years. He was a man of high character, and was highly respected by his colleagues and the public. His death was a great loss to the legal profession and to the community. He was buried in Vancouver on Wednesday morning.

Hon. Mr. Fisher for Japan.

Ottawa, July 18.—Hon. Sydney Fisher and Mr. Wm. Hutchinson, ex-M. P., will probably leave for Japan in October. The Canadian Government will erect a separate building at Osaka, in which to display the Canadian goods at the exhibition to be held there in 1903. The Japanese authorities intended the use of 5,000 cubic feet of space for this purpose, but as it was not considered by the minister of agriculture to be sufficient, it has been decided to erect a new building.

BIG CROWDS VIEWED SHOW

Forepaugh & Sells Bros. Circus Pleased Spectators.

Important Features Omitted in the Evening Performance.

Forepaugh & Sells Bros.' big circus exhibited yesterday to large audiences at both afternoon and evening performances. The circus, while a good one, is hardly up to the standard set by Ringling Bros.' show last year. Those who attended in the afternoon saw much the better performance, as several important features were omitted in the evening, including the unicycle ascent and descent of the spiral stair, and the scaling of the 20-foot fence by the Aurora Zouaves. The reason given for this omission was that 40 attacks of the circus was at Woodstock, and that the limited force left could not expeditiously erect and take down the required appliances and paraphernalia. The best feature of the circus was undoubtedly the looping of the loop by Diavolo. For the few seconds which it took him to shoot down the long incline and round the dizzy circle, the spectators held their breath, while a long sigh of relief went up as he rolled safely out on the smooth turf beyond. Almost equally thrilling was the cycle whirl by the Jackson family, in which five riders dashed at breakneck speed around a track 20 feet in diameter and elevated at an angle of 90 degrees. Another feature worthy of mention was the drill of the Aurora Zouaves. The performing elephants, the tumbler and the acrobatic performers were good, while the equestrian features were fair. The show left for St. Thomas at an early hour this morning.

A FORWARD MOVEMENT

Missionary Scheme of Ailsa Craig and Carlisle Presbyterians.

Give Support to a Worker on the Staff in Honan, China.

The Presbytery of London met at Ailsa Craig on Monday evening of this week, when Rev. J. H. Bruce, B. A., Toronto, was ordained to the ministry and designated as a missionary to Honan, China. Rev. Dr. McTavish, of Toronto, was present in behalf of the foreign mission committee. Mr. Bruce took a high standing in his academic course, being a graduate of Toronto University and Knox College. He has some time been assisting to Rev. Dr. McTavish, in Central Church. The reason of the ordination being held in Ailsa Craig lies in the fact that the joint congregation of that place and Carlisle (Rev. W. H. Geddes, pastor) has recently decided to contribute \$500 annually for five years toward the support of one of the missionary candidates who had offered for service. The foreign mission committee was highly pleased with this proposition, considering the strength of the congregation, and at once allotted the above named gentleman. In the raising of this fund no canvass was made, but instead subscription lists were sent to the members, with a short explanation of the proposed plan, which had previously been submitted from the pulpit, with the approval of the joint session. These cards were returned, with the above result. The pastor asked the people from the start to make the effort a matter of prayer, believing that apart from the direct result, the congregation would receive a spiritual benefit. This fund will not represent the total missionary giving of the congregation, being for a special object. It is interesting to note also that the neighboring congregation of Naim and Beechwood (Rev. Jos. Elvett, pastor) has for some years been contributing a substantial portion of the salary of Rev. J. A. Shummon, so of the Honan staff. Their last pay, for this purpose was over \$450. This plan of individual congregational support for the foreign missionary appears to be steadily gaining throughout the Christian church, and bids fair to prove a great impetus towards the more rapid spread of the Christian faith among the people who have heretofore lived and died in ignorance of its saving truths.
