as Ever. PARENTS ARE MUCH CONCERNED

Those Who Saw Him Last Can Give No Indication as to His Whereabouts.

Toronto, Aug. 14.-Nothing was learned yesterday which could throw any light on the mystery surrounding disappearance of Arnott White. His parents are as greatly concerned as ever with regard to him, and are in no better position to understand his

behavior. David L. White, father of the missing lad, said he had made diligent in-quiries about him during the day, with no result. It had been supposed that Arnott had taken a train for Chicago or some other point in the west, and that he had made use of his father's name in "working his way." Mr. White asked the conductors running trains to the west, as well as those for the east, whether they had seen or heard anything of the young man, and an answer in the negative was returned in each case. A similar question was put to the captain of one of the Niagara steamers, on which Arnott White had traveled a few weeks ago, but nothing had been seen of him there during the past couple of days. Mr. White was unable to

offer any opinion as to what had become of his son.

WHITE'S CHUMS. Arnott's chums were two boys, Albert Fiegehen, who lives on Augusta avenue, and Archie Clark, living on Baldwin street. The former works at the Gurney foundry, while the latter is employed by A. A. Allan & Co. To these boys he was likely to confide any plans he might have made regarding a change of employment. These lads called to see Mr. White last evening, and he implored them to tell anything they knew which would furnish a clue to Arnott's whereabouts. They declared emphatically that he had never said anything to them about going away, nor had they any idea as to where or

why he had gone. WHITE DISSATISFIED. Mr. White said that Arnott occasionally discussed at his home the happenings at the Evans warehouse, but he never gave the impression that he thought himself suspected. He had not concealed his dissatisfaction with the circumstances surrounding his employment, but he had never attrihension of suspicion against himself, a few of them were wounded. It had been reported that he had mentioned this suspicion to a fellow-workman at the warehouse, but the father holds that this could not be true. in the Evans establishment.

WELL THOUGHT OF. Arnott White was highly regarded at the Evans warehouse, and all those above him there have ridiculed any idea of suspicion against him. They say that his work was satisfactory in every way, and that he gave every evidence of a desire to please his superiors and to make progress. He was doing fairly well, considering his age, and there was nothing against

A police officer who has watched the case closely was asked if the authorities wanted young. White in connection with the Evans mysteries. "No," he replied, "we do not want him. His people have not asked us to look for him, and we have no other reason for instituting a search. Nothing that has been learned regarding the happenings at the warehouse

would permit of suspicion being directed against anyone. It has not been shown that any crime was committed in connection with the death of Geen and Whalley, and consequently there is no cause for the police to want THE TALK OF POISON. Charles Doherty, the head shipper at the Evans place of business, was ask-ed about the statement which White made to him on Monday evening with

reference to poison. He declined to discuss the subject, and said he was not in a position to make any statement. He would not deny that White had used the words, and declared that at the proper time he would tell what he knew. Doherty, White and Alfred W. Gilbart left the warehouse together on Monday evening, and walked to the corner of King and Yonge streets. There Doherty boarded a car for King street east, while Gilbart went west. They left White standing on the corner, and as they moved away from him he used the words referring to the poison keeping him away.

Disturbances in France Still Continue.

BARRICADING THE Thirteen Remain Unclosed in One District-Troops Asked For to

Enforce Law.

Brest, France, Aug.13.-Soluiers have been requisitioned in several places in Finistere, during the past two or three days to protect police commissaries engaged in closing religious schools, from threatening crowds.

Thirteen schools belonging to White sisters remained unclosed in Finistere. A battalion of infantry and a strong body of mounted gendarmes are expected at St. Meen, Folgoet and Ploudaniel to overawe the excited population of those towns.

The inhabitants of Folgoet are engaged today in building walls of masonry behind the principal door of the church school.

At St. Meen scouts on horseback, bicycles and even on motorcycles, are on the lookout for the police. The peasants declare they will throw beehives among the gendarmes and will put beehives in the barricades.

THE TOCSIN RUNG. The expulsion of the sisters at Concarneou was undertaken today. Scouts on automobiles reached the town at 2 o'clock in the morning and reported that troops were on the way. The tocsin was rung, bugles were blown, and boys ran through the streets ringing hand bells. Large crowds gathered around the railroad station and around the schools: Several bodies of gendarmes and two companies of infantry arrived by a special train. The commissary ordered the school evacuated, at which the crowd shouted "Long live the sisters." The gendarmes advanced toward the general scrimmage followed. Later the troops reached the building and the police tried to break down the door-
