IN DANGER OF DEATH

Princess of Wales Had a Very Narrow Escape

From Meeting a Terrible Fate at the Shire Horse Show.

Crimes Act To Be Vigorously Enforced in Ireland—Amendment to New German Tariff Bill.

London, Feb. 27.—The Princess of Wales had a very narrow escape at the Shire Horse Show today. The winning stallion, Hixton Tom, was being led down the ring as the royal party was leaving the inclosure. The cheering scared the animal, which got almost beyond control of the groom. He made a dash for an exit, through which the prince and princess, with the other members of the royal party, were just about to pass.

They appeared totally unaware of the danger until the shouts of warning from all parts of the building attracted their attention. Then the princess, who was nearest the animal, realized her danger and stopped short.

The stallion rushed by her royal highness, missing her by a foot or two, and the only way he was saved from the fate which he deserved was by the skill of the groom, who managed to pull the animal to one side as it dashed past the royal party, at a very serious and deplorable accident was averted.

GERMAN TARIFF CHANGES.

The tariff committee of the reichstag adopted the compromise amendment to the new tariff bill, regarding the corn duties, in spite of strenuous opposition by the government members.

The vote on the amendment was 14 ayes to 10 nays.

The amendment raises the minimum and maximum rates on wheat to 6 and 7 and a half marks per 1,000 kilograms, respectively, and on oats and barley to 5 and 7 marks per 1,000 kilograms respectively.

WILL ENFORCE CRIMES ACT.

The Right Hon. George Wyndham, chief secretary for Ireland, at the Carleton Club, exhaustively discussed the Irish question in strong terms, declaring it to be a political machine which constituted the gravest menace to the community. He said the league had corrupted the whole moral fabric of Ireland, and declared the only course of action was to apply the stern application of the crimes act, which he proposed to see rigorously enforced.

ALMOST LYNCHED!

An American seaman, named Chas. Brown, narrowly escaped lynching at South Shields, Durham, Wednesday afternoon, for killing a fellow-sailor.

A general fight broke out on board the Liverpool steamer Beacon Light, Capt. Kelly, which was anchored in the Tyne, during which Brown shot a sailor named James Brown, and got ashore. Here he was captured by a constable after a hard fight on the dock, and it was with difficulty that he was rescued from the mob. Brown was carried to the police station, and as the constable laid the American's revolver on the ground, a crowd of sailors gathered round the prisoner, and a bullet seriously wounded another sailor.

NOT COMING TO CANADA.

There is no foundation for the statement, called to the United States, that Lord Henry of Prussia will visit Canada before returning to Germany.

TURKEY RESPONSIBLE.

It is understood that the United States will shortly make steps to obtain a reimbursement of the sum (\$72,500) paid to the brigands as a ransom for Miss Ellen M. Stone and Mme. Tekla, holds O'Rourke responsible, inasmuch as the capture of the mission was affected on Turkish soil.

This question of responsibility may have serious results, as the United States emphatically disclaims responsibility, and lays the blame on Bulgaria.

SCENE IN FRENCH CHAMBER.

A dispatch from Paris to the London Times says that in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday afternoon, the other deputy, calling him a Communist. A Socialist retorted that the appellation was an honor, and all the Socialists rose and singing.

The president protested vainly, and both sides shouted wildly. Order was gradually restored.

A NEW LIBERAL LEAGUE.

Lord Rosebery has authorized the formation of a new Liberal league, with himself as president, and H. Asquith and Sir Harry Fowler and Sir Edward Grey as vice-presidents, to act, as it is authoritatively announced, in conjunction with the rest of the Liberal opposition on the lines of the policy expressed in Lord Rosebery's speech at Chesterfield. This rather ambiguous announcement is probably Lord Rosebery's first practical move to test the strength of his following among the Liberals.
