YACHTING.  
MAST WAS BROKEN.  
New York, June 17.—The Reliance, Constitution and Columbia today competed for a cup given by Commodore Adams, of the yacht club. The race was over a course providing a six mile run down the Sound, a beat back of six miles to Glen Cove, and a short reach across the Sound of three miles to the starting buoy. A heavy triangle sailed twice over 30 miles in all. At 1:30 when the warning signal was sounded the wind was blowing seven or eight knots. The yachts went across the line at 1:46 with the Columbia leading. The yachts had just crossed the line when the topmast of the Reliance was carried away, breaking off about ten feet from the masthead. After the accident the Reliance held across the Sound off the course, while the crew were clearing away the wreckage of the broken topmast. The Columbia and Constitution continued in the race, the latter gradually gaining. C. Oliver, Jr., managing owner of the Reliance, was on board the yacht when the accident occurred. When he came ashore in a launch he said none of the rigging parted and he could not understand just what caused the accident. "No one was hurt," he said, "and we shall be in Friday's race at Greenwich." He said the accident lightly and seemed not at all discouraged. The Herreshoffs were immediately communicated with at Bristol and another topmast ordered shipped to City Island. Columbia held her lead on Constitution, but the latter was beyond it in the thrush to windward.

DERBY VICTOR  
IS HARD PUZZLE

History Proves That Novice Is as Safe a Guide as the Expert—  
Battle of Rich Owners.

The American Derby, which is the only counterpart of the Derby at Epsom Downs, will be run at Washington Park next Saturday to the accompaniment of a big display of fashion. For the first time, the Derby has been a feature of the day, but the absorbing interest has always been in the Derby winner.

Of the weight of expert opinion can decide the race it will be the Irish Lad, of New York, and Savable, of Chicago. It will again be the story of the east against the west. It will be a battle of millions. The son of William C. Whitney, America's greatest turf patron, will be pitted against John A. Drake, Chicago's most enthusiastic horseman.

It will be a match of trainers, John W. Rogers, the silent man of the east, will measure strength with the peculiarly effective trainer of the west, Harry H. Hurd, who trained the last Derby winner and the last Futurity winner. The race, if opened as it has been, will bring about a strife of jockeys. Jockey Tommy Burns, a great rider, will have for his rival jockey Charles Gray, the new western star.

Expert opinion, however, seldom picks the Derby winner. It chose Heno last year and Wyeth, scalloped away with the prize. It picked The Parader the year before and Robert Waddell upset all hopes. It guaranteed Lieutenant Gibson in 1900 and Lieutenant Gibson finished third to Sidney Lucas.

Popular opinion is not with any particular horse. It expects the experts to go wrong. There is a deep-seated belief in the minds of the average fan that the Derby that there will be a surprise. The history of the race has a distinctly Chicago victory. Savable is now the positive favorite for the race. After his great victory in the last year, his odds were cut from 4 to 3 to 1. Irish Lad is still 4 to 1, but his odds are cut from 10 to 1 to 5 to 1. A signal for cutting his price.

It is the magnificent uncertainty of the race that makes it so great. Last year 60,000 people, according to the estimates, found room within the inclosure of the Washington Park Club. Perhaps one-third of them had a financial interest in the result of the race. The remainder were there for the spectacular features of the great event.
