WOODS' FAIR.

STORM AT THE CAPITAL.

Kills One Man and Fatally Injures Two Others.

Ottawa, Aug. 7.—A terrible electrical storm, accompanied by a wind of cyclone force, which swept down from the north, struck the city with awful force at 4 o'clock yesterday. At Deschene, seven miles from Ottawa, it hit the big sawmill being erected by the Fraser Company, blowing down three walls of the power house, killing three men, and fatally injuring another, seriously injuring a third and slightly injuring three others. The dead man is James Campbell, son of ex-Alt. W. J. Campbell, boilermaker, Ottawa. Joseph Valiquette, a boilermaker's assistant, had his back broken, and was seriously injured. John Chubb, a lineaman, was seriously injured, but had a good chance for recovery. The others were only slightly injured. Campbell was sent by his father to superintend the installation of a sawmill carrier, and was in the boiler room when the cyclone struck the building. Three walls were blown in, and the men buried in the debris. They were speedily released and every hand made in bringing them to the hospitals in Ottawa. Campbell had a leg crushed, but it was evident that he had suffered internal injuries. He died on the electric car coming into Ottawa. Valiquette was taken to the Catholic Hospital, and was reported as having no chance for recovery. Chubb is in St. Luke's Hospital. The loss to the Fraser Company was about \$10,000. The storm caught four young men in a yacht on Lake Deschene, who had a narrow escape from drowning. They clung to the upturned boat for an hour before being rescued. Resulting parties were repeatedly swamped before the storm calmed sufficiently to allow a boat to put out. Trees were blown down and C. P. E. Semences snapped as if they were so many reeds. In the city very little damage was done beyond the uprooting of a few trees.

SPAIN CHECKS DODGED BULLETS IN OLD KENTUCKY

The Steam Yacht of Jacques Lebaudy Seized. An Engineer Tells His Experience With Moonshiners.

HOW HIS PARTY WAS FORMED WAS COMPELLED TO DRINK

Member of Expedition to East Africa Gives Details of Millionaire's Project. Detective as Brakeman on His Train Captured Waldron, the Illicit Whisky King.

Chicago, Aug. 7.—"The best job I ever had in my life," remarked C. P. McManus, the secretary of the Milwaukee County Sheriff's Relief Commission, who is a locomotive engineer by trade, "was in running a locomotive from Richmond Junction Ky., to Jellison on the border line between Kentucky and Tennessee, right through the heart of the moonshine district, where they have been having so much trouble since the war account of the family feud and the long list of shooting affrays that have followed."

"I only held the place a few months, however, as I was too much for me. As a soldier I had traveled all over Kentucky during the war, and could stand it well enough when I had a chance to shoot at an open enemy. That, however, was the wildest and most lawless district I was ever in. We couldn't keep a red light on our train. It was the special delight of the moonshiners to shoot them to pieces. They would also shoot the lanterns as the brakemen hung them on their arms when we had to stop at night and pick up cars at the mills along the route."

"It was Waldron, the king of the moonshiners, who had shot several detectives, and he was the particular game that McManus was after. He succeeded in landing his prisoner in the penitentiary, where he is still serving a sentence."

"While we were at Little Pittsburgh one night, setting off empties and pulling loaded cars on to the main switch for the north-bound freight, to pick up, as was the custom with the south-bound train, a man got on the engine and asked:

"Where are you going?"
"To Woodbine," I replied.
"I'm going with you," he said, and producing a bottle of whisky, invited me to take a drink.

"I declined on the ground that I had no headache."
"Someone has got to drink!" he exclaimed, and the next moment he had the fireman covered with his gun and was handing him the bottle.

"The fireman was obliged to drink in order to save his life."
"How long do you stay here?" he inquired.
"Half an hour," I replied.
"He left the engine, and a few moments later returned with two bottles of beer."

"This would give you the headache," he remarked.
"He next suggested that I hold the bottle up and allow him to shoot the neck off, but I declined and broke the bottle on the side of the cab and drank the contents."

"A few such experiences as this was enough for me, and I quit the job. Most of the feud during that quarter are the result of the war. The communities divided between the Union and Confederate cause, and fought each other during the rebellion, and have kept it up ever since. The families became involved in shooting scrapes, and the stirring days, and the relatives of the victims, Union and Confederate, have kept it up as a sort of feud ever since, and probably will for generations to come unless a stop is put to it by the law."

GALA DAY AT CHATHAM

Port Huron Merchants Run a Big Excursion.

Chatham, Ont., Aug. 7.—The Port Huron Merchants' and Manufacturers' Association's annual excursion, which visited London last year, came to Chatham yesterday about 1,000 strong. In the morning the Port Huron baseball team was easily defeated by the local team, score 12 to 5. In the afternoon Chatham and Blenheim played an exhibition game of lacrosse. It was a slow game, but the Chatham team, when the locals got into the game, scoring three goals, the score having before stood 2 to 0 in favor of the visitors. The game ended 3 to 2 in favor of Chatham.

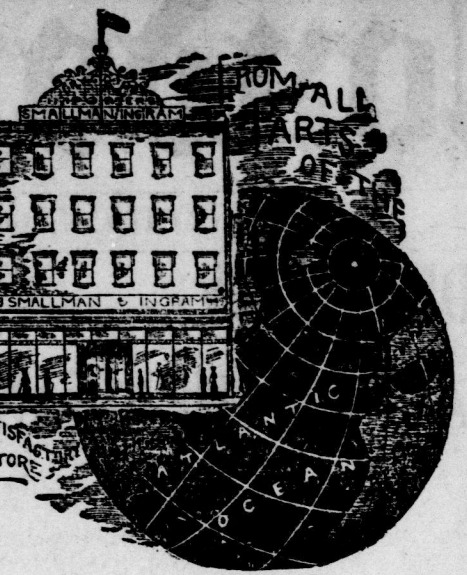
