In a recent speech at Harvard, President Roosevelt, an old Harvard athlete, publicly and energetically championed football and other games requiring courage and endurance. Here are some of the things he said:

"We cannot afford to turn out of college men who shrink from physical effort or from a little physical pain. In any republic courage is a prime necessity for the average citizen if he is to be a good citizen; and he needs physical courage no less than moral courage, the courage that dares as well as the courage that endures, the courage that will fight valiantly alike against the foes of the soul and the foes of the body.

"Athletics are good, especially in their rougher forms, because they tend to develop such courage. They are good also because they encourage a true democratic spirit, for in the athletic field a man must be judged not question. with reference to outside and accidental attributes, but by that combination of bodily vigor and moral quality which go to make up prowess.

"In a republic like ours, the governing class is composed of the strong men who take the trouble to do the work of government; and if you are too timid or too fastidious or too careless to do your part to be considered one of the governing you become one of the governed, instead-one of the driven cattle of the political arena.

"It is of far more importance that a man shall play something himself, even if he plays it badly, than that he shall go with hundreds of compan-


