Ship's Carpenter Got It. On May 6, 1808, Thomas Knight and Puncan Cameron, his attorneys, sold o Joshua Leach for \$121 50 a portion of the property 208 feet along the north side of King, with a depth of 104 feet. This included the Janes lot at the corner. Leach held on all through the war of 1812, feeling no doubt when the Americans landed here and burned the parliament buildings and the fort that he had been very foolish to invest his good English gold in a dinky little town like York. But on June, 1814, he saw a chance to get out right; and when a ship's carpenter by the name of John Dennis offered him £400, or about \$1,-944 for his property, he took it quick.

Getting Valuable.

John Dennis died, but his son, Joseph, held on to the lot till June 15, 1836. By that time Toronto had a population of over 10,000, had been incorporated as a city for two years, and fered him \$544 for a small piece of it ent Government.
