ELGIN COUNTY COUNCIL VISITS SANATORIUM

Shown Over the Byron Institution and Entertained by Staff.

The Elgin County council, in session at St. Thomas, paid a visit yesterday afternoon to the Byron Sanatorium. They expressed themselves as being delighted with the institution.

Among those who made the trip were Mayor Guest, County Magistrate Francis Hunt, George Russell, Alexander Anderson and Sheriff McColl, St. Thomas; S. R. Summers, Michael McKnight, Aylmer; Sid D. McDermid, Knightview; Dan McKillop, West Lorne; W. H. Moore, Port Burwell; J. J. Mitchell, Lyons; Robt. Grass, Vienna; A. Lechman, Cowan; Absalom Gilbert, Talbotville; D. Stratton, Stratfordville; W. W. Campbell and Donald McLean, Rodney; John Dromogole, Wallacestown; J. E. Lindsay, Springfield, and Dr. Ling, Dutton.

The party was taken to the sanatorium in a special car at 1:30 o'clock and made a thorough investigation. On its completion they were the guests of Dr. Mahood, the medical superintendent, at luncheon. County Magistrate Hunt and Dr. Ling, Dutton, made short speeches, in which they congratulated the London Health Association on the enterprise and energy displayed in securing so fine a sanatorium for the city and surrounding district.

Sheriff Cameron made a brief response on behalf of the London Health Association, in which he thanked the visitors for their kindly assistance. He hoped that they would come often to see how the work was progressing.

CANDY HANGED FOR KILLING POLICEMAN

Montreal Murderer Today Paid Penalty For Brutal Crime.

Montreal, Que., Nov. 18.—Timothy Candy, the slayer of Policemen O'Connell and Fortin, was hanged at the Montreal jail at 7:57 this morning. The crime for which he paid the death penalty was committed when he was caught with a bag of stolen rubbers, which he was trying to sell. Arrested on suspicion, he used the revolver which he carried while serving as watchman in the warehouse from which he stole the goods.

Up to last night Candy was in a remarkably calm state of mind, but during the evening, in the silence of his cell, with the ever-watchful eye of "The Death Watch" upon him, his resolute talk of the daytime was heard no more, and after the evening meal, his guard saw him sobbing bitterly, with his hands up to his face, muttering incoherently, while at intervals the names of his wife and children were heard.

He retired about 10:30, but evidently passed a restless night, tossing around in his cot. This morning he arose calmly as usual and exchanged his customary greetings with the guard who relieved the night watch at daybreak. Shortly afterwards his spiritual adviser called.

Candy's first signs of interest in his forthcoming doom were shown in his questions regarding the construction of the scaffold.

Then Candy asked how the rope would be arranged around his neck. He was told that the knot was placed under his ear.

"Why do they do that?" he said, "I suppose it is that which breaks the neck."

Further than this, he was given no details of how executions are arranged, and in fact the guards always try to turn the prisoner's mind away from such subjects and to keep him in as cheerful a frame of mind as possible.

Had Morbid Thoughts.

Yesterday he showed an unnatural tendency to dwell morbidly upon what would happen. He expressed his deep sorrow for what he had done and said he had no doubt the Montreal public would look upon him as a coward for sending two men to their death last spring. Suddenly, however, he braced himself and announced that if his death could be any retribution, he would face it like a soldier and a sailor.

Candy had been in the British army for several years, but most of his life had been spent upon the sea. In any event, he said he knew the British traditions of facing death and would be true to them.

CRUSHED TO DEATH WHEN BRIDGE BROKE

Christopher Boyce Was Pinned Under Big Traction Engine.

Blenheim, Nov. 18.—Chris. Boyce, son of Alexander Boyce, was instantly killed when a heavy traction engine, which he was driving over a bridge in Halesleigh Township, crashed through the structure. Boyce was pinned beneath the wreckage, and it was some time before the body could be extricated. He was 22 years old.

THE ASSAULT CASES TO BE SETTLED SATURDAY

Evidence in Trials of McGurk and Dart Taken Yesterday.

Having heard the evidence of a number of witnesses, Judge Macbeth yesterday adjourned the cases against Henry McGurk and Howard Dart, charged with indecently assaulting two little girls in Westmount on Nov. 1, until tomorrow, when the cases will be disposed of.

The court opened at 11 o'clock and was resumed immediately after the noon hour. The last evidence was taken at 5 o'clock, when Judge Macbeth announced that he would bring the prisoners up again on Saturday.

There are four charges, two against each prisoner, the parents of the little girls being the complainants.

UNIONISTS ARE STILL FOR TARIFF REFORM

Hon. A. J. Balfour Made Announcement Last Night at Nottingham.

Nottingham, England, Nov. 14.—The leader of the Opposition, Hon. A. J. Balfour, addressed an important political gathering here tonight. He dealt with the present crisis from all angles and outlined the policies of the Unionists.

Tariff reform, he said, still stood as the great constructive policy to which Unionists were committed, but if the benefits therefrom were only purchasable by throwing the burden on the wage-earning classes he would not touch it. The Unionists proposed to wage no defensive warfare, but to show the country that they had an imperial and domestic policy, carrying infinite advantage to the country.

He advised his audience not to believe all the unauthorised reports concerning the proceedings of the veto conference, and said that if the Unionists had agreed upon the only terms which would have made any agreement possible, they would have betrayed their cause. He considered that the House of Commons should be the dominant element in the two-chamber system, and that dissensions arising between the two chambers should be submitted to the people's arbitration.

In the opinion of the speaker, the House of Lords' membership should be reduced to men of public service. There should also be an element elected by the peers, and another element, equal to the other two, representing the great bodies of public opinion.

He proposed a wholly elective second chamber, because it would usurp the position of the first.

BEEKEEPERS MEET

Interesting Papers by Miss Robson, of Ilderton, and E. Bainsard, Lambeth.

Toronto, Nov. 17.—"Can a Woman Run an Apiary?" was the subject of a splendid paper by Miss Ethel Robson, of Ilderton, at the first session of the Ontario Beekeepers' Association in the county council chambers. She proved that a woman could.

E. T. Bainsard, of Lambeth, discussed "The Successful County Association."

"Over 5,000,000 pounds of honey is produced in Ontario," said President Wm. Couse, of Streetsville.

W. H. Fugley, of Richmond Hill, Indianapolis, Nov. 17.—As the quickest and most direct plan of getting rid of Mayor Shank, a bill for a commission form of government for this city is being prepared, and will be backed by businessmen before the coming session of the legislature.

The bill will provide that any city in the state having more than 5,000 population may hold an election to decide whether the commission form of government shall be adopted. If the proposition carries, a city election must be held within 60 days for the election of members of the council.

This council will govern the city, each member being placed in charge of certain departments of the city administration. One member of the council will be known as the mayor of the city, but he will not have any more to do with conducting the city's business than any other member of the council.
