AWAIT RETURN OF GENERAL CASTRO

Traveller Declares That Times Are Ripe for Dictator's Reappearance in Venezuela.

New York, June 30—That the larger Governments of South America are apprehensive of the coming celebration of the independence of Venezuela, on July 3, is the opinion of Mr. Newton Gulick, who has just returned from a trip through the southern republics of more than a year's duration, Mr. Gulick has been investigating the rubber situation in South America and as a result has become quite intimate with a number of the diplomats in the various republics. He says that most of them expect the presence of General Castro in the West Indies now, and from the Brazilian minister, who will be a delegate to Venezuela's celebration, he said, he icarned that the friends of General Castro have prepared the way for his entrance into the country.

"I met this minister," said Mr. Gulick yesterday afternoon in his apartments at the Waldorf Astoria, "while on my way to Port of Spain, Trinidad, and he showed me cable advices from his home Government, which contain-New York, June 30 - That the larger

"In Venezuela the times are ripe for the reappearance of General Castro. Ever since he left there his party—and there was not even a postman who did not owe his position to the deposed dictator—has been busy, and they are ready for the celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of their freedom from Spain.

"If Castro lands in the country he will surely be returned to the presisency, for he will have the army behind him. The crowds which will attend the celebrations in the larger sities will be the proper mask for the sovements of his party, and the other South American countries are watching Venezuela like so many cats a ratuole."

PNEUMONIA SERUM TAKEN FROM ROOSTER

Antibodies Obtained With the Aid of Chanticleer.

New York, June 30.—Serum with a protective action—against pneumonia when inoculated into certain animals has been perfected by Dr. Preston
Kyes, of Chicago, who contributes an
article on the experiments he has
made to the current number of the
Journal of the American Medical Asociation.

Most of the studies which have beer

made regarding the germ of pneumonia have been made upon animals which are very susceptible, and Dr. Kyes has selected what he believes are the most insusceptible of creatures available—barnyard fowls. One of his most elaborate experiments has for its subject a white leghorn roos-ter weighing almost five pounds. The inoculations were made with a prep-aration obtained from human lung involved with acute lobar pneumonia. Dr. Kyes believes that it is pos-sible by the inoculation of fowls with extreme doses of pneumococci to ob-tain a serum of specific antibodies and possessing distinct protective ac-tion against pneumococci within cer-tain hosts.
