POTATO GROWERS NEED HIGHER GRADE SEED

American Farmers Are Told
They Could Increase Crops
Ten Per Cent.

Washington, March 30.—The American
potato grower is charged with paying
too little attention to the selection of
seed potatoes by the department of
agriculture, in a statement today declar-
ing that by the use of high-grade seed
the returns from the crop would be in-
creased by many millions of dollars. The
increase that might be expected from the
use of high-grade seed is conservatively
estimated at not less than 10 per cent,
such an increase, based on the average
production of the past five years, says
the statement, would amount to over
300,000,000 bushels, having an approxi-
mate value of \$21,000,000.

JAPANESE PRINCE REFUSES PREMIERSHIP

Viscount Keigo Kiyoura Now Named and
Will Probably Accept.

Tokyo, Japan, March 30.—Prince Iyato
Tokugawa, president of the House of
Peers, today declined to undertake the
formation of a new Japanese cabinet, al-
though questioned to do so by the Em-
peror, and the Ministerial crisis brought
about by the naval scandals was therefore
settled. The emperor's decision there-
upon submitted to his majesty by the
name of Viscount Keigo Kiyoura, who has
previously held several cabinet portfolios,
and the Emperor summoned him to an
audience tomorrow. It is generally
thought probable Viscount Kiyoura will
accept the offer of the premiership.

STEFANSSON CONFIDENT

New York, March 29.—Confidence in

lost track of months ago, was increased
today by a letter from the explorer in a
