American Farmers Are Told They Could Increase Crops Ten Per Cent.

[Canadian Press.] Washington, March 30 .- The American potato grower is charged with paying too little attention to the selection of seed potatoes by the department of agriculture, in a statement today declaring that by the use of high-grade seed the returns from the crop would be in-creased by many millions of dollars. The increased by many millions of dollars. The increase that might be expected from the use of high-grade seed is conservatively estimated at a total conservatively estimated at not less than 10 per cent, such an increase, based on the average production of the past five years, says the statement, would amount to over 360 000 000 bushels, having an approximate value of \$21,000,000. Of the many causes which operate to produce a low average potato yield in the United States it is pointed out, pure seed is an important one. European potato growers, Germany, pay the strictest attention to these places during May.
