BANKS GAINING GOLD SLOWLY OUTLOOK GOOD

Situation Abroad Is Steadily Improving With Balkan Crisis Practically Past.

Mexican Situation and Eastern Railway Trouble Are Disturbing Features.

[Special to The Advertiser.] New York, July 21.—The situation abroad is somewhat improved. Acceptance of finance bills, now beginning, indicates this, with belief that the Balkan crisis is now past for good. But this does not release hoarded gold; revival of confidence must come first. At any rate, for five or six weeks we shall probably see a lull in the demand for gold, the stock market will have its chance. Then will come again tightening money and crop scares. But by that time the European situation may be further cleared, the tariff bill passed, the currency bill nearer perfection, and the crop, notwithstanding scares, pretty well assured.

Copper has become active and steady with European buying revived at a high level of volume. Cheerful views of steel predominate, although consumers are waiting for easier financing before putting orders, and new contracts are declining, with steel mills busy on old business.

American foreign trade for the fiscal year 1913 shows big increase—\$420,000,000 in total. Both exports and imports show gains over all past years. The excess of exports was \$653,000,000.

Banks Gain Gold.

The banks of England and Germany both gained gold last week. The Bank of France gained only slowly, and mostly by importations from this side. In figures the English bank added \$4,000,000 the French Bank \$3,000,000, and the German Bank \$9,000,000.

Their stock of gold. With the German Bank this is a continuation of its remarkable gain in strength since April 1, when its stock was \$54,000,000 small, and now, and the amount of its circulation and loans together, have been reduced over \$105,000,000. This is a remarkable picture of what a strong central bank can do, especially in times of crisis. The gold stock in June the notes rose to \$575,000,000, or \$165,000,000 more than the same day one year ago. The supply of gold has risen with the circulation; it is now \$94,000,000 higher than at the end of 1912.

Strike Settlements.

A Difficult Task.

It will take a long time to mold such a country into a democratic republic. Mexico has not yet developed a large middle class, which forms the backbone of every prosperous nation, a middle class created from the good stock of the country, and added to by encouraging immigration on a large scale, as is done with great success in Southern Brazil and Argentina.

This is the condition that confronts President Wilson, and that he goes slowly in recognizing what is much like a temporarily dominant revolution is not to be wondered at. He is probably better informed of conditions than the numerous amateur advisers, who are heard from every hour. The return of Ambassador Wilson with even more intimate information will perhaps enable him better to decide what to do.

An ingenious solution has been suggested of a somewhat practical turn. It is that the United States purchase, at a reasonably liberal price, and annex, the four northern states of Mexico. An enormous immigration of substantial people would flow into these new states, and the United States under United States Government protection, and would soon put their restless populations in order. Supplied with ample funds in this way the provisional government, which would then be recognized by the United States, might be able to put down and control what was left of heterogeneous Mexico.

BRITISH BANKS WILL FINANCE CANADIAN CROP

Are Arranging to Help Move All Grain by Prompt Loans.

Two London Banks Ready to Advance \$5,000,000 at Any Time.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, July 21.—Confirmation of the report published some days ago in trade and monetary papers, that British financial institutions were ready to make extraordinary preparations for financing their end of the Canadian crop this year, is published in the weekly report of the department of trade and commerce.

Mr. P. A. Bickelike, Canada's trade commissioner at Manchester, reports that newspapers in his district have lately announced that two or three British banks, which do a large trade in bills of lading for wheat from Canada, have arranged for special advances for their London agency during the autumn.

These banks, it is said, have prepared for a possible continuance of the financial stringency by themselves arranging that larger financial institutions will take these bills as credit, pending the sale and actual payment for the wheat.

In addition to this, two important London banks, says the report, have ventured to advance \$5,000,000 each to assist in moving this season's grain to market, and these banks have not confined their overtures to their own representatives in Canada, but have made an open offer to other financial institutions.

Montreal, July 21.—Following the deliberations of the city council's special finance committee, which has been investigating the money stringency as affecting civic works, it has been decided to appeal to the citizens for aid, either by local subscription of the city bonds or by direct cash payments for improvements by the citizens. The bonds, it is proposed, will take the form of debentures, which will be sold to citizens in small amounts, and in order to make them attractive, the interest rate will likely be raised to 6 or 7 per cent.

BITTER ATTACK ON FREE TRADE MADE IN SENATE

Failure of the New Tariff Is Prophesied by Senator Burtoa.

The Tendency, He Says, Is for Nations to Restrict Their Markets.

[Canadian Press.] Washington, July 21.—Denunciation of free trade as a timely policy for the United States, apprehension of failure of its purpose for the Underwood-Simmons tariff bill, and an attack on an ad valorem tariff system, were voiced by Senator Burton, of Ohio, today, when tariff discussion was resumed in the Senate.

Senator Burton declared he was no worshipper of protection as a "fetish," but that he approached the subject of the tariff "rather with the conviction that whenever there shall be an era of comity and mutual concession in trade among nations, and our country shall have reached a point when its productive capacity had been finally developed, free trade might be a national policy."

Restricting Trade.

Such, he said, was not the case, the disposition "to restrict trade among nations and to grant concessions in return only on rendering concessions in return," being on the increase.

Asserting that a free trade policy only is applicable on the theory that it universally can be applied, the Ohio senator declared:

"The attempt on the part of a free trade nation to apply the theory in practice, without the concert of other nations, revealed the serious disadvantage of such a position. Even if theoretically in the most correct situation she is in far the worse position to enforce her point of view. She can have recourse to no other means of protecting her interests except to persuade the statesmen of other countries that they, together with herself, would be better off under a regime of freedom in commerce; while they, on the other hand, can bargain between themselves to her disadvantage, and at the same time profit by access to her open markets."

Hurts Fiscal Policy.

Senator Burton further declared that the Democrats had framed a bill which literally tears to pieces the fiscal policy of the nation, in order to satisfy the craving for lowering the cost of living and to justify the declaration of a party platform that the chief cause of the high cost of living was "the existing protective tariff enacted by the Republican party."

GAS FAMINE

Mains at Berlin Were Blocked With Naphthalene Refuse.

It was caused by a piece between the gas tank and the city main becoming blocked with naphthalene refuse from manufacturers of coal gas. Only early risers were able to enjoy a warm breakfast.
