

There will no doubt be some argument on the proposed advancement in prices as some of the threshermen believe that if an advance is made that a ton. the farmers will do as they have done in other counties, form clubs and pur-chase threshing outfits of their own. Large This would necessarily put the man Pea Coal, who made a business of threshing alone out of work and this, they claim they

must guard against. Others, who take the opposite view. maintain that unless prices are advanced that they will have to go out of business anyway, because the present scale of prices is not profitable enough to let them make any more than a bare living.

The threshermen as the matter stands, face a two-sided problem, but may compromise on the present sit-uation and not take action of such a nature as would bring about the formation of farmers' threshing clubs.


