CREATED HERE NOWConference to Deal With Dis-
trict-Wide Plans in Session

ASK FOR REGISTRATION

Demands for Some Form of It
Certain at This Afternoon's
Meeting.Concentrated effort to systematize
recruiting in No. 1 Military District in
such a manner that the loss to manu-
facturing industries through enlist-
ments, will be minimized, came into
being as a result of the recruiting con-
ference held in the Masonic Hall this
afternoon. At the meeting, it is con-
fidently expected, resolutions calling
on the Government to adopt some form
of military registration in order that
the slacking of Canada may be called
to the colors as well as the slacking
of the old country, will be passed.
Though not scheduled to open until
2:30, an attendance of more than 150
was present half an hour before that
time and was steadily increased by
both local and outside delegates to the
conference. The meeting was finally
called to order.The local members of the Women's
Emergency Corps were prominent in the
representation, and other city organiza-
tions, such as the board of trade, coun-
cil, recruiting association, and so on,
were also well represented.
The military department was repre-
sented by Lieut.-Col. J. E. F. O'Connor,
Col. L. W. Shannon, D. O. C. officers
of the headquarters staff and other of-
ficers of the C. E. F. who came to lend
their assistance in the formulating of
district-wide recruiting plans.MORE THAN \$1,000,000
IN TAXES ALREADY PAIDFirst Installment Passes All Records in
City's History.Major George W. Hayes, the city tax
collector, has received over a million
dollars in taxes from the citizens, a re-
markable showing.The total amount to be collected is
\$1,418,882.
Up to August 1, the last day on which
the first installment could be received,
he collected and handed over to the
city treasurer the sum of \$456,131. He
still has on hand checks and money for
which no receipt has yet been given,
amounting to \$559,114, a total of
\$1,015,245.This is about 80 per cent or more of
the whole taxable amount, showing that
the people had the money, and were
willing to pay their taxes. This is the
largest collection on record.
Major Hayes stated to The Advertiser
that he had so many checks on hand
that it would be possibly two weeks be-
fore the receipts were returned to the
citizens. He asks that they be patient
until they receive them."That is a record amount, and shows
that the people have money," said Major
Hayes. "We have been almost swamp-
ed by the tide of money, but we will get
things straightened out in a short
time."TEUTONS CLOSE
TO EXHAUSTION
OF MEN FOR WARBritish Military Experts Be-
lieve Enemy Cannot Hold
Out Long.

AUSTRIA'S DIRE DISTRESS

Transfer of Turkish Troops To
Gallia Considered Highly
Significant.

HUN LOSSES 8 MILLIONS

End of the Second Year of
Conflict Shows Foe's Casu-
alties Stupendous.[Canadian Press.]
London, August 2.—As military ex-
perts here view the situation on this
second anniversary of Germany's decla-
ration of war against Russia, they point
to the great change in conditions since
August 1, 1915, and assert with confi-
dence that the Kaiser's statement in his
letter yesterday to Chancellor Von Beth-
mann-Hollweg that the fatherland is
invincible, will be disproved before the
third year of the conflict is over.Incidentally British observers are in-
creasingly convinced that Austria and Germany
are nearing the point of exhaustion,
available troops needed for a prolonged
defence against the Allies on all fronts.

Austria's Dire Distress.

The reports that a Turkish army
of corps had been moved to the support
of the Austrian line on the eastern front
were received with skepticism here,
where it was thought that the Turks
needed the troops available in Armenia.
The Russian minister in London, who
stated that the report had received confirma-
tion by eye-witnesses, this use of Ot-
oman forces is regarded by experts as
indicating that the Russian army is
in a dire straits.Teuton Losses 5,000,000.
"What have been the Teutons' losses

over 5,000,000 men.""The losses of the Austrians and Ger-
mans therefore, cannot be less than
5,000,000, and probably 8,000,000. These
figures do not, of course, represent the
total losses, except in the case of Aus-
tria, of whose 3,500,000 the greater
proportion are definitely out of action.
Austria, like every other country en-
gaged in the war, made extraordinary
calls upon her population. She has about
6,000,000 men, that is to say about 12
per cent of her population available for
service. If their mobilization were possi-
ble, the Russian occupation of Gal-
icia interfered to a great extent with
that mobilization, and it is doubtful
whether Austria ever mobilized more
than 4,500,000, or at the most, 5,000,000
men. Of these a very large number
have been absorbed in non-combatant
service, such as munition making, work-
ing the railways, etc., and allowing
for the young and old men, at present
doing garrison duty or training in
depots, Austria's military strength is
now under 500,000."The loss of guns and material makes
it impossible for Austria to replace the
men employed in the munitions works
while for the very salvation of the two
empires it has been necessary to retain
a very large number of men in agricul-
tural employment. The Russian experts
say their recent offensive resulted in
the enemy losing 66 per cent of his ef-
fectives, but this may be a too hopeful
view.""At any rate, it is evident that the
Austrian army has been terribly de-
creased in size and in fighting power,
and that no effort the Germans can
make can replace the battalions which
have been obliterated in the recent
fighting."

A Swiss Opinion.

Col. Feyer, the Swiss strategist, puts
the German strength in the west at
1,475 battalions, that is to say, 1,322,500
men. In the east he puts about half
that number, so that on all fronts he
calculates the German army as num-
bering about 2,500,000 bayonets. At the
outset of the Verdun offensive the Ger-
mans asserted that they had a suffi-
cient number of men to hold all the
fronts, and, in addition, had 600,000
men in the next six months, a striking
force of 1,500,000 men available for ser-
vice on any front.The Teutons powers have about 1,250
battalions of front to defend in the main
theatres of the war. With the growing
pressure of the Allies everywhere, apart
from the special offensives, the Teuton
wastage is probably reaching the figure
of 10 men a mile a day, or 8,500 a day,
or 250,000 a month.The conclusion drawn here by con-
servative military statisticians is that,
even if the German claims were true, they
are no longer accurate, and that in-
stead of a striking force of 1,500,000
German headquarters staff must be hard
put to provide one or half a million men
for the purely defensive purposes
and to meet the wastage along the ex-
tensive threatened front. If this con-
clusion is correct, some military experts
say, the Kaiser's declaration at the end
of the second year of the war that Ger-
many is invincible will be disproved be-
fore the third year is out.

TO DROP ATTACKS
ON FOOD VESSELSThreaten To Close the Eastern
Frontiers Unless Subs
Withdraw.

London, Aug. 2.—The German Govern-
ment has issued a pledge to Holland not
to destroy or molest Dutch ships carry-
ing foodstuffs to England, according to
this decision is the result of a visit to
Berlin by Count J. K. Van Aalst,
president of the Overseas Trust, and
another Dutch commissioner.
The Express says Van Aalst presented
an ultimatum to the authorities in
Berlin to the following effect: "Unless
Germany agrees not to interfere with
Dutch ships bound for England with
foodstuffs, otherwise the Netherlands
will close her eastern frontier. The
Dutch will stop Dutch imports from America
and the Dutch colonies."The trip of Dutch commissioners
was the result of representations by the
Entente that Holland was selling large
quantities of foodstuffs to Germany.
The Dutch government, however, had
almost ceased trade with England
since the outbreak of the war, and
then undertook the trip to Berlin, af-
ter a series of conferences about Ger-
many's acceptance of his demands.A BLACK PICTURE,
