The Londoners in dire need of three games to cinch the second series or at least tie the argument up with Bay City, yesterday treated over 5,000 fans to the spectacle of losing three games to the sixth-place Kitchener Beavers, while the Michigan Wolf pack with two straight wins from Saginaw cinched the second half championship. Rumors of throwing the series have been rampant ever since the race for the second half began to tighten. The London players had everything to gain by winning yesterday and avoiding a Mint League playoff. Exhibition games had been arranged and a playoff between the Central and Mint Leagues was on tap—a program that meant money for the players. Instead through losing yesterday, the exhibition games have been made practically impossible, and the London players are forced to participate in a series with Bay City from which the Mint League largely benefits, and not the players.

These remarks concerning the players are unfair and rather uncalled for after the way the London club has battled in the second series not only against the teams, but against the administration.

President Maines' last-minute attempt to discourage London by ruling all their games forfeit because of the transfer of Oakes, is perhaps the prexy's parting shot. The London club would have fought the ruling because Oakes was let go by Flint when picked up by London. Whether Halligan, Flint owner, officially notified the league office of that fact is not known and it is possible that on a technicality, the president was sure of his ground before he issued the order.

Meantime no date for the playoff has been decided upon, but it will likely be hurried along and will consist of home and home games with probably a seven-game series.
