NO MONEY INVOLVED

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—The management of the New York American League team announced late today that the club had traded Pitchers William Henry, Rip Collins, Jack Quinn and Shortstop Roger Peckinpaugh to the Boston Americans, in exchange for Pitchers Joe Bush and Sam Jones and Shortstop Everett Scott. No cash consideration was involved in the deal, it was said by Colonel Jacob Ruppert, part owner of the Yankees.

Peckinpaugh has been captain of the American League champions, and is rated as one of the most brilliant players in the country. Scott also has been an infield star for several years, having established a record for consecutive games played in the major leagues.

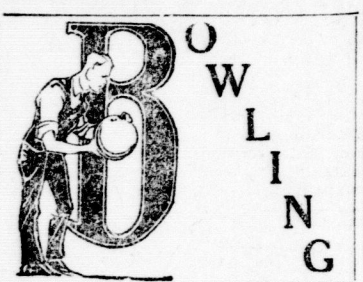
Three Winners On English Turf

'RED' FABER LEADS AMERICAN LEAGUE

Had Winning Average For Pitchers of .625 Won 25, Lost 15.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—American League pitching honors for the 1921 season, calculated according to the number of earned runs per nine innings, as officially announced tonight, went to Urban "Red" Faber of the Chicago White Sox.

Faber pitched a seventh-place team, the Sox star turned in the winning average of .625. Faber won 25 games and lost 15.

George Mogridge, Washington south-paw, had a good season, finishing second with an average of 3.90 earned runs per nine innings. His percentage was .563, his record being 18 games won and 14 lost.

Philadelphia had the greatest number of runs in a triple play, 11, 10, 9, 8, 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, 1, 0. Chicago also first in double plays, 153. St. Louis had seven passed balls and New York eight.

Chicago, Washington, St. Louis and Detroit each turned in a triple play. This latter was undoubtedly made possible by the fact that never before were so many men left on bases as was the case this year.

Prominent among the individual records is that of First Baseman McInnis of Boston, whose record for the year is .309, he being charged with but one error in 152 games.

W. J. Jacobson, St. Louis, was first among the outfielders who played regularly, with an average of .363. Jacobson, with 472 putouts and seven assists was third in catches accepted.

R. H. Veatch of Detroit, with 384 putouts and 21 assists was first among the catchers with Steve E. O'Neill, Cleveland, second, and E. P. Cheney, Washington, third.

R. W. Schalk, Chicago, is again first among the pitchers with Steve E. O'Neill, Cleveland, second, and E. P. Cheney, Washington, third.

WOODSTOCK JUNIORS GET C. GORRIE AS COACH

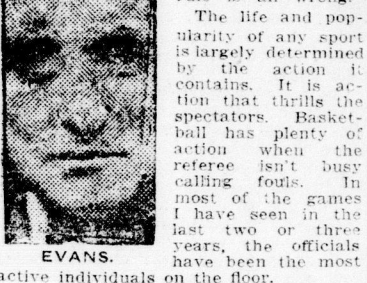

BILLY EVANS SUGGESTS FIVE CHANGES IN CAGE RULES

Should be? I put that question to a number of the country's leading coaches.

The answer in every case was the same, basketball had not achieved the popular favor that it deserved.

Free Throws Are Too Frequent. Too many basketball games are won on free throws. Such a result lessens the winning run in a ball game by calling a foul. It is too tame a finish for an exciting game.

That has been the chief fault of basketball for years, too much stress being laid on the foul. Since all coaches and experts are agreed that the foul rule needs revision, it seems certain that some action will be taken

at the next meeting of the rules committee.

Changes in Scoring. Here are some of the suggestions that will tend to take away some of the importance that is now attached to the throwing of fouls. As a matter of fact, basketball as now played is a game of specialists, in which the expert on the throwing of baskets from the foul line is featured.

1. Award a point or a half point for every foul called against an opponent.

2. Deduct a point or a half point for every foul called against a team.

3. Whenever a foul is called the ball be declared dead, and be given to the offended side, with the right to put it in play without being hampered by guarding.

4. Require the opponent of the player who commits the foul to 15 seconds free throw.

5. Change the scoring rules as follows: Goal from field, 3 points; goal from personal foul, 2 points; goal from technical foul, 1 point.

The first three suggestions seem best as they place an equal penalty for each offence.
