

FEARS ANOTHER WAR IF GENOA PARLEY FAILS

Lloyd George Paints Gloomy Picture of Conditions in Europe.

POLES FORWARD REPLY

Tells Russia She Acted in Interests of Reconstruction.

GENOA, April 26.—Prime Minister Lloyd George drew an alarmist picture of Europe tonight. In addressing the British and United States press representatives, he declared the object of the Genoa conference was to clear up political difficulties which were full of peril. He compared Europe to a burning lava, which like the lava's crust was seeking a proper level. This adjustment was full of peril. He emphasized that Europe must take cognizance of hungry Russia, which would be equipped by an angry Germany.

Lacks Frontier Line. As proof of the danger he cited the fact that there was no frontier line from the Baltic to the Black Sea, including the Rumanian, Galician, Polish and Lithuanian frontiers which has been accepted.

"I wish America were here," he exclaimed. "Some persons think we want the United States for a selfish purpose. This is not true. We want America because she exercises a peculiar authority. Her very aloof-

ness gives her the right to speak; but America is not here, so Europe must do her best to solve her problems in her own way."

Mr. Lloyd George gave it as his opinion that the disorganization of Europe would affect the entire world, including the United States. He was amazed at people who ignored the portentous fact facing Europe today. Unless Europe reorganized, in other words, unless the Genoa conference succeeded in arranging a pact of peace, he was confident that within his lifetime, certainly within the life of younger men, Europe again would welter in blood.

Sees Another War. "We triumphed in the recent war," he said, "but our triumph will not last forever. If our victory develops into oppression vengeance will follow. Germany's action, which started the world war was followed by vengeance. We must be just and equitable and show strength."

The British prime minister solemnly urged the press to instill patience, good-will and fellowship throughout the world.

POLAND SUBMITS REPLY. GENOA, April 26.—Announcement by the British delegation that a meeting of the signatories of the Versailles treaty will be held in Genoa within a fortnight to determine upon the future of Poland, in the event of Germany's failing to meet her reparations obligations at the end of May was the chief feature of today's conference activities. This call for a meeting of the Allies was inspired by Premier Poincaré's Bar-le-Duc address intimating that France was prepared to act alone if the Allies failed to support her in enforcing the treaty.

Poland Replies. Poland replied to Russia's protest, charging the Poles with violating treaties with Russia and seeking to undermine Russian sovereignty. The Polish reply asserted that the Poles were endeavoring to assist in the reconstruction of Russia and had no aggression of power which it proposed to submit to the conference, the experts here from many lands were hurrying on with their technical work connected with economics, finance and transport.

Holds Final Session. The transport commission held a final session and recommended the urgency of the powers adopting all possible measures in concert to improve the transport system of Europe. The League of Nations was asked to invite the nations, whether members or non-members of the league, to work together on technical matters furthering the cause of transport.

The experts insist that important things have already been done at Genoa in the way of improving conditions; these have largely taken the form of arranging for future conventions, but it is pointed out that that present convention, including 34 states, has brought about knowledge of actual conditions in Europe which is certain to prove beneficial for future efforts towards amelioration.

which I think are known to almost everyone.

"The act of this young man, was the act of a mere youth. It was foolish in the extreme, more foolish than a 16-year-old boy with the ordinary gunpoint of the average boy in the city would think of."

"What possible use could this property be to him? It was unthinkable of what use he could put it to. It would be a practical impossibility to dispose of it. It was a foolish boy's trick that no one in his senses would do."

"How old are you?" asked Mr. McEvoy, turning to Shillington. "Twenty-five years," responded the prisoner.

Immature for Age. "In my conversation with Shillington, I do not think that he is as old as many boys are at twenty," continued Mr. McEvoy.

"I ask you to consider the fact that restitution has been made of 90 odd per cent of the bonds. Of the \$10,000 remaining \$2,500 was found in his possession, and will find its way back to the company."

There is not much to guide your worship as to what sentence should be meted out. I took the trouble to get particulars regarding a somewhat similar case, where John Doughty took a quantity of bonds about the same value from his employer. The theft was denied and a serious battle was fought in the assize court, and after a three-day battle the trial judge, whom you know, and who most of the legal fraternity know is not lenient, imposed a penalty of six years on Mr. Doughty. He was a man of maturity, over 50.

"This boy I look upon as a youth, and I appeal to your wisdom from your knowledge of boys, your own boy and my boy, to do what is best for this boy. The community must be protected. I realize that, but the young man should be given a chance to rehabilitate himself after paying the penalty."

"No one who has been injured has any vindictiveness toward the young man. He must pay the penalty, and it seems to me that the matter might be disposed of right now," concluded Mr. McEvoy.

"The facts are within your own knowledge, your worship," declared Mr. Douglas. "This man is 25 years of age, and knew the trust imposed in him. The violation of his trust was deliberate, and he would not be here today if he could help it. Restitution on his part was not voluntary."

"Didn't he show the officers where the bonds were?" put in Mr. McEvoy. "Yes, but they would have got them anyway," retorted Mr. Douglas. "This man was an employee in a company doing business with the public. The theft was not made under an impulse or strain."

Magistrate's Address. "Shillington, it is, unfortunately, my luck to deal with your case," stated Mr. Bartlett, "and although it is a very unpleasant duty, I have no wish to avoid it."

"There is one feature that is not without its value to the community at large, and that is that it is a warning to all young men or women,

or older men, who occupy positions of trust in financial institutions. "The world is different to what it was a few years ago," continued Mr. Bartlett. "Owing to facilities such as the telephone and wireless, it is practically impossible for a man to get away with a matter such as this, and an attempt to escape is just as impossible."

"You are not a mere child, and old enough to realize your duty to your employer. At the same time you have not the experience of years as others charged with the same offence and I am taking this into account."

"I don't suppose that anybody realizes as much as yourself the utter folly of your act. No doubt you were glad when you were arrested and brought back here. If you had managed to get away your life could never be anything but unhappy with the knowledge that you had committed this crime and that the police officers were on your heels and liable to overtake you."

"Any young man who thinks he can fool the law is a fool on every point of view. The law has a strong and a long arm, and you realize when you are here in this position that you have been a most foolish kind of man."

Public Must Be Guarded. "The public must be guarded, although I do not believe in a harsh administration of the law, nor on the other hand, any weakness. The law should be tempered with mercy, but beyond that it should not go."

"What Mr. McEvoy said about your family has been in my mind a long time, and I am not dealing with the matter on the spur of the moment."

"I have taken into account the sentence imposed by Mr. Justice Riddell on Doughty, who stole \$100,000 from his employer. Doughty was not only guilty of stealing bonds, but may have been implicated in the disappearance of his employer, A. J. Small."

"Doughty was an older man than you, and had more experience. The law is more severe on a man of his age."

"I think that in my best knowledge to meet the demands of public justice and your own case, I will sentence you to six years in the provincial penitentiary," concluded Mr. Bartlett.

An order was made for the return of the stolen bonds to the company, and also the money recovered from Shillington.

WOULD HOLIDAY AS PROTEST SIGN

London, April 27.—(Canadian Press Cable).—The Leeds Trades and Labor Council has recommended to the National Joint Labor Council to call upon every trade unionist in the country to remain idle on a given day at an early date as a protest against the action of employers in locking out members of the Amalgamated Engineering Union and also to demand a government inquiry into the whole circumstances of the engineering dispute. The lockout order was issued following the rejection by the men of a revision of shop rules, giving the employers greater managerial control, especially in the matter of overtime.

Parade a Feature.

Headed by both bands of the Royal Canadian Regiment, whose services have been kindly lent by the military authorities for the occasion, the parade will move down Talbot street to York street, to Richmond, to Queen's, to Colborne, to Dundas, and then to Wellington street, passing the reviewing stand yet to be erected in front of the city hall.

Proceeding after the march past, to Clarence street, the boys will march to Victoria Park, where another reviewing stand will be erected. The remainder of the afternoon will be devoted to patriotic exercises, singing, etc., under the direction of W. E. Quantz, instructor of music in the public schools.

The Rotary Club has arranged for its big boy demonstration on Wednesday, when the dignity of labor will be emphasized.

Cost—Principal cost is in personal service. The boys will visit the industries in groups. Each group will contain about twelve boys, under the leadership of a male teacher or a good boy leader. Each group will be a unit in going through an industry. Each group should know its group number.

The boys of Grades VII and VIII, and any other boys over 12 years of age, whom the principal may wish to send, will constitute the groups.
