**CLUBS ENGLAND**  
**'IS NOT A FOOL'**  
Justice Riddell in Stirring Ad-  
dress To Kiwanians At  
Osgoode Hall.

**LONDON WINS BALL GAME**  
Illinois and Pennsy District  
Governors To Speak At  
City Club Friday.

TORONTO, June 21.—"One Bunker  
Hill is enough—England is no fool,"  
said Mr. Justice Riddell in addressing  
the legal men who are delegates to  
the Kiwanis convention here, at the  
luncheon tendered the Kiwanian  
lawyers by the bar association at  
Osgoode Hall today.

"Anyone who reads the original  
documents, which are seldom read,  
will realize how Britain has been  
urging Canada to assume her own  
nationalhood, as a part of the em-  
pire.

"We are sprung from the same  
root—the great English common law,  
the British constitution, and the  
great principles of order and peace  
and justice," Justice Riddell declared, that Can-  
ada and the United States might have  
quarrelled over every inch of their  
border line, but they didn't—instead  
of that they had dwelt together in  
peace, though they had disputes and  
acute disputes. But these were set-  
tled by negotiation.

His lordship roused the lunchers  
to cheers and shouts of approval  
when he asserted that the greatest  
public address of any age in any  
country was that delivered by Wood-  
row Wilson before the United States  
Senate on April 1, 1917, when war  
was declared on Germany by the  
United States. And he was saying  
this, he remarked, to men who might  
be prejudiced against Woodrow Wilson.

Mr. Justice Riddell amused the  
Americans by his description of the  
British constitution, which he char-  
acterized as "the finest piece of  
camouflage in existence"—because  
it didn't mean what it said.  
The king "ruled by the grace of  
God," but he was proud to rule by  
act of parliament; he was "Defender  
of the Faith," because Henry VIII.  
wrote an answer to Martin Luther's  
attack on Rome, though by law the  
king must be a Protestant. There  
were other similar points.

**Peace Must Prevail.**  
Even without a League of Nations  
peace in the world must prevail if the  
English-speaking peoples said there  
should be peace. No treaty or bond

stronger necessary—"there is something  
stronger than such a bond of paper."  
The audience rose and cheered the  
judge for several minutes after he  
had finished, and then an American  
lawyer exclaimed: "That's the great-  
est address I ever heard. I move we  
give Mr. Justice Riddell a standing  
vote of appreciation."

And up they rose again.  
At the resumption of the conven-  
tion in Massey Hall this afternoon  
Charles Leslie of the Lions' Club  
presented President Karr with a big  
bouquet of roses as a token of the  
kindly feeling of the Lions' Club in-  
ternational.

The convention took a huge de-  
light in roaring "No" votes on propo-  
sals by the resolutions committee  
to put past presidents and past gov-  
ernors on executives as non-voting  
members.

**London Wins Game.**  
A feature of the day was the fact  
that the London (Ontario) Kiwanis  
Club baseball team defeated the  
Kingston team by a score of 19 to 8,  
thus securing the cup donated by  
Harold Shipman of Ottawa, Ont.

and Quebec to the number of 300 held  
a special luncheon and were addressed

**INTENDS TO ERECT**  
**\$500,000 BUILDING**  
**London Life Insurance Com-**  
**pany Secures Three Duf-**  
**ferin Avenue Properties.**

All property on the south side of  
Dufferin avenue, from Wellington  
street to the First Presbyterian  
Church, a frontage of 334 feet, and  
including the home of the late Sir  
George Gibbons, the residence of for-  
mer Mayor J. W. Little, and the old  
McDonagh home, has passed into the  
hands of the London Life Insurance  
Company, at an approximate price of  
\$100,000.

With this public announcement  
Wednesday afternoon, Edward E.  
Reid, president of the insurance com-  
pany, intimated that plans were  
under consideration for the construc-  
tion of new office buildings, at a cost  
of probably \$500,000. It was quite  
possible, he added, that one of the  
three homes would not be demolish-  
ed, but would more than likely be re-  
modeled as a clubhouse for the em-  
ployees of the company.

The property just purchased has a  
depth of about 200 feet, and the  
buildings erected thereon will be  
quite modern, but not more than  
four stories in height, as the sky-  
scraper type of structure is not de-  
sired.

Actual work will not commence for  
four or five years.

**PROTEST SALES**  
**TAX METHODS**  
Western Ontario Grocers  
Pass Resolution To Be  
Sent To Fielding.  
Retailers Urge Collection of  
Entire Levy From  
Manufacturer.

Holding that the present govern-  
ment system of collecting sales tax  
from the retail grocer instead of  
from the manufacturer is unjust, 75  
grocers from various points in West-  
ern Ontario decided at a meeting in  
the Tecumseh House Wednesday  
afternoon to register a protest with  
the minister of finance, Hon. W. S.  
Fielding, asking that the legisla-  
tion be changed, and that the entire sales  
tax be collected from the manu-  
facturer.

Fred S. Lawrence, secretary of the  
D. S. Perrin & Co. Ltd., of this city,  
addressed the grocers on the sales  
tax and the manner in which it af-  
fected the retail grocer. He explained  
to them that it was the desire of the  
manufacturers that the government  
collect the sales tax directly from  
them, instead of from the retail  
grocer, as the case is at present. By  
so doing, he stated, bookkeeping ex-  
penses would be decreased consider-  
ably.

**Secured Compromise.**  
He pointed out that a short while  
ago he had gone to Ottawa and had  
interviewed the government on the  
matter. His visit was a partial suc-  
cess, as the minister of finance com-  
promised, and with the result half  
the sales tax is now collected from  
manufacturing concerns and the  
other half from the retail grocer.

However, the grocers are dissatis-  
fied with the new legislation, and as  
the manufacturers are equally an-  
xious that all the tax be collected  
from them, the protest was sent by  
the Western Ontario Retail Grocers'  
Association to Ottawa.

The stamp tax and the receipt tax  
were also criticized by the grocers,  
it being claimed that both were a  
detriment to business.

That the high price of groceries  
was due to the freight rates was the  
claim of many present, one man cit-  
ing a case where the freight on a  
case of sardines routed from Leaming-  
ton to St. Thomas, was 50 cents a  
dozen bottles.

Among the representatives present  
from out of town were: Messrs.  
Shaddock of Ilderton, Waring of  
Lucan, Panter, Hockin, Wildsworth,  
Jeffery of Dutton, McKenzie and  
Egan of St. Thomas, Mailer of For-  
est, Hunt of Dorchester, McLaren  
and Stewart of Belmont, Northcott of  
Mount Brydges, and Jolly of St.  
Thomas.

Harry Rananah of this city acted  
as chairman.

The grocers of London will hold  
their annual picnic Wednesday, July  
19, and committees will be appointed  
this week to make arrangements for  
what is expected by the retailers to  
be the biggest picnic of the summer  
season.

All the city officials have been in-  
vited to attend, and Mayor Wilson  
has announced his intention of de-  
claring a holiday at the city hall that  
afternoon.

**SAND SLIDE DELAYS WORK**  
**OF TREASURE HUNTERS**  
Capt. Carson Will Make Descent  
Early Thursday Morning.

PENETANGUISHENE, June 21.—  
High winds and heavy rains upset  
the plans of the treasure hunters  
who are dredging the muddy depths  
of the Wye River in quest of the  
missing Jesuit chest. It had been  
the intention of Captain Carson, who  
has charge of the operations, to make  
a descent beneath the water and ex-  
amine personally the position of the  
box. Just as he was making ready  
to don his diver's suit there was a  
swirl in the water, and the sand bank  
at the edge of the excavation slid  
down. Probing showed, however, that  
little damage had been done, as most  
of the sand went beyond the position  
of the box, although two or three  
extra feet remain, and this will have  
to be cleared away tomorrow. As  
soon as this is done Captain Carson  
will make his descent.

The treasure hunters confidently  
expect that it will be only a question  
of hours before their search is con-  
cluded.

constituency to contest the seat as a

Larter is the second fusion candi-  
date to be nominated in the province,  
the other being Dr. J. R. Edmundson,  
Brandon, against A. E. Smith, M.L.A.,  
Larbor.

**Fear Rail Freight Rate Cuts Will  
Cost Roads More Than \$16,000,000**  
OTTAWA, June 21.—The new pro-  
posals of the railways in regard to  
rate reductions would mean, accord-  
ing to the evidence of their repre-  
sentatives, a loss in revenue of ap-  
proximately \$16,000,000. These fig-  
ures were given to the special house  
committee on railway transportation  
costs.

The largest estimate of loss came  
from the C. P. R. and was for \$3-  
\$35,000 to which the biggest contri-  
bution was made by the new reduc-  
tion on grain.

The Canadian National estimate  
of loss is \$6,971,000, made up of \$4-  
\$14,000 on grain; \$1,183,000 on lum-  
ber and forest products, coal and  
coke, \$484,000, etc.

The losses by the Grand Trunk  
aggregate \$1,053,000 of which lumber  
forms the largest item at \$326,000.  
In addition to these figures of the  
railways put in estimates of the re-  
venue they will lose as a result of  
the recent 10 per cent reduction by  
the interstate commerce commission.  
The Grand Trunk put this as \$2-  
\$275,000; the Canadian National rates  
at \$1,250,000, and the C. P. R. at  
\$2,220,000.
