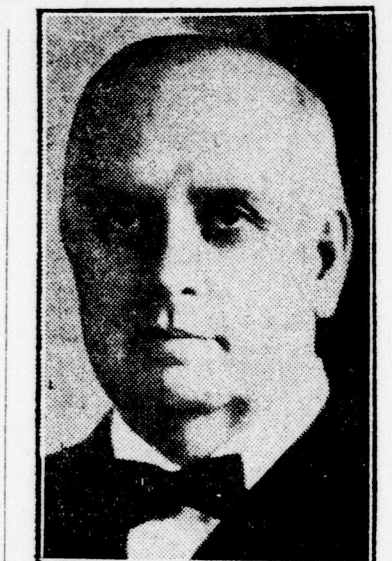

count will be investigated. These moves were decided on by the public accounts committee of the legislature today, after hearing the evidence of Edwin H. McMillan, former teller of the Bank of Toronto at Stratford, that Mr. Smith had deposited one or more \$1,000 bills in his bank in December, 1919, a few weeks after becoming provincial treasurer. Mention has been made at former hearings of the committee that \$1,000 bills were used by the Home Bank to pay commissions on deposits.

The committee decided to summon G. L. McHattie, manager of the Stratford branch of the Bank of Toronto, to give details concerning Mr. Smith's account. Without Dissent. The motion, which was adopted without dissent, to bring Hon. Peter Smith before the committee, also asked for the appearance of Hon. T. W. McGarry, treasurer during the Hearst regime; C. H. Sproule, Mr. McGarry's deputy-treasurer; C. A. Matthews, the deputy-treasurer who was suspended the other day, and L. C. Mason, who is married to Mr. Matthews' stepdaughter. The motion was introduced by W. E. N. Sinclair, the Liberal leader.

The committee today also heard evidence concerning a check for \$12,500 drawn in March, 1920, on the firm of Aemilius Jarvis & Company, which was payable to Alfred Victor Young, who at that time was an eighteen-year-old employee of the Jarvis firm.

The witness was Mr. Young himself, who testified that the check was made payable to him instead of to cash in accordance with office practice. He had obtained the cash from the bank and handed it all to Harry Peppall, another member of the firm. The \$12,500 check was charged to the Jarvis "commission account," some six or seven months after the transaction, Young stated. He did not know how it had been charged in the meantime, unless to the "special account" of Aemilius Jarvis, Sen. Mr. Young said he knew that about the same time the Jarvis firm handled a \$5,000,000 loan for the provincial government. He had also observed that a commission of one-quarter of one per cent on the loan would be \$12,500.

Reference has already been made at former hearings to a commission obtained by Andrew Peppall, brother of Harry Peppall, for obtaining business for the Jarvis firm from the provincial government. It was Andrew Peppall, who went to London on a mission for Hon. Peter Smith.

MANAGER SILENT.

Stratford, April 9.—G. L. McHattie, manager of the Bank of Toronto here, refused to make any comment whatever this afternoon, when he heard that he was to be called before the public accounts committee in connection with the Peter Smith account held by this branch during the latter part of 1919.

He had not received official notification from Toronto, he said.

The Hon. Peter Smith, when informed over the telephone of the decision of the committee to call him to testify, said that he was quite willing to appear. The special force of private detectives were still doing duty at a late hour this afternoon.

C.N. RAILWAY TRAINMEN ASK WAGE INCREASE

Brotherhood Forwards Application To Have Negotiations Reopened.

An application has been forwarded to the Canadian Railways Association by the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen asking that negotiations be immediately reopened and the employees of the traffic department of the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railways be granted a 5 per cent increase in wages. Thomas Kelley, an officer of the general grievance committee of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, stated today that steps have been taken to secure an increase for the employees, and that a conference will likely be held in Montreal within a few days, which he will attend. More than 800 district railwaymen will be affected if the agreement is adopted.

Increases applied for are as follows: Passenger trainmen, 24c a day; freight trainmen, 30c a day; conductors, 32c a day; brakemen, 26c a day and switchmen, 36c a day.

CROWLEY IS ELECTED MICHIGAN CENTRAL HEAD

AMENDING UNION BILL DENOUNCED BY PART CHIEFS

Assert Entire Proposition Should Be Placed Before Federal Parliament.

SAY QUESTION NATIONAL

Toronto, April 9.—Leaders of the church union today issued a statement dealing with amending the church union bill by the private bills committee of the Ontario Legislature, in which the procedure of the committee is severely criticized.

"From the beginning of our Canadian life," says the statement, "the various Christian denominations have been drawing together. Union after union has taken place, and any necessary legislation sought by the uniting churches has been granted. A new situation, however, has been created by the action of the private bills committee of the legislature."

The statement continues: "We recognize the authority of the provinces in matters of civil rights, but the provinces cannot determine that Dominion-wide churches shall not unite. The churches operate in each province and beyond the borders of the Dominion. They have decided to unite for the common prosecution of their work throughout the Dominion and in foreign mission fields. These three churches have decided their ecclesiastical policy in view of Dominion-wide conditions, and the one body which can say whether the United Church of Canada is to be recognized by law and given incorporation is the Parliament of Canada. Therefore to settle this question we now make our appeal directly to the Parliament of Canada, before whom our petition for legislation has already been presented."

The statement adds that the resolution adopted by the private bills committee "deprives these churches of their right of self-determination, and is contrary to the whole principle of representative government. We recognize the sovereign power of the state within its own sphere, but we are persuaded that it is outside its proper sphere when it declares that a dissenting minority of individuals is the church and shall be the church."

Those signing the statement are: J. Lambert Alexander, chairman of the Congregational Union of Canada; S. D. Chown, general superintendent of the Methodist Church; Alfred Gardner, moderator of the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

COMMITTEE TRIMS GREGORY REPORT

Recommend Only Summary Should Be Published—Would Save Thousands.

Toronto, April 9.—The printing committee of the legislature recommends to the House that only the summary of the Gregory report in hydro matters, as given by Premier Ferguson, be printed. The committee has used the pruning-knife freely in the printing of reports, and many that have always been printed will not be put in type this year. The committee estimates it will save the province many thousands of dollars in printing costs.

The legislature this afternoon had a dull session, dealing largely with technical amendments to bills in the committee stage. The bill creating a mining court went through committee. H. A. Fisher (West Ottawa) asked how the mining court judge could be removed from office. Hon. W. F. Nickle contended that the man in charge of the mining court would not be a high court justice, although he would have the same power. He added a clause to the bill that he could be removed only by the lieutenant-governor in council on the advice of the legislature.

The bill to tax improvements in unorganized territories also passed through committee. The bill decreasing the bounty on wolves from \$40 to \$20 also passed second reading, as did the bill providing for inspection of homes before immigrant children are placed in them.

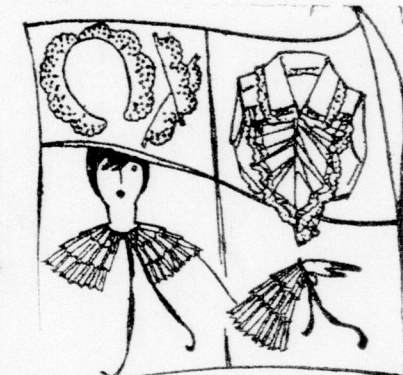

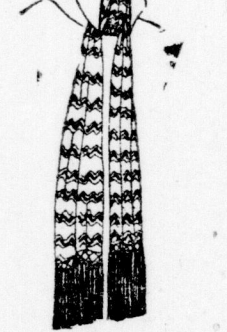

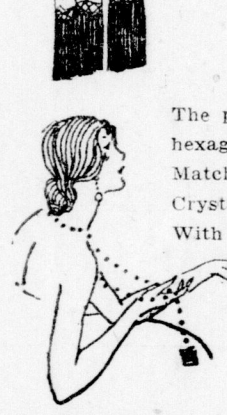
