

GRECO-TURKISH ROW THREATENS

Hellenic Statesmen Allege the Turks Making Wholesale Arrests of Countrymen.

OFFICIALS WORRIED

Brussels, Oct. 27.—What statesmen who framed the Lausanne treaty frankly have termed "one of the most cruel decisions in history" threatens to create serious complications in the near east, according to League of Nations spokesmen who assembled in Brussels last night in preparation for the special meeting of the council of the league, which will open this afternoon.

That decision, arrived at as the most practicable means for avoiding future wars between Greece and Turkey, was that of arranging for the compulsory exchange of populations between Greece and Turkey—that is, Greece back to Greece and the Turks in Greece back to the territory of Islam. Greece now contends that Turkey is violating the terms of the treaty of Lausanne by making wholesale arrests of the Greeks of Constantinople, who were exempted from the exchange arrangement, provided they had established themselves in Constantinople before 1916.

M. Politis, who has succeeded M. Venizelos as the Hellenic statesman abroad, will arrive here today prepared to defend to the last Greece's charges against Turkey; and his friends assembled last night that the Greek people upon the situation as extremely grave unless Turkey should show signs of meeting Greece halfway and affording some protection to Hellenic residents in Constantinople.

The league officials are worried because they are not sure that Pethi Bey and his Turkish associate representatives will agree to any cessation of the Greek charge, as the meeting of the council of the league was called especially to consider the dispute between Great Britain and Turkey over the Iraq frontier and the Greek problem has come at the last moment while Pethi was on his way to Brussels from Ankara.

RIVER BOATING PRIVILEGES STILL GOING ABBEGGING

W. Ainsworth, 150 St. Julien street, has not as yet jumped the gun in offering him by the public utilities commission in answer to his application for exclusive boating privileges he desires to grant to him for a period of five years on a percentage basis of the gross receipts, the percentage to decrease from 10 per cent the first year and 10 per cent the second year, to 20 per cent the third year and for the two years thereafter. He was also informed by the commission that the application was automatically cancelled at the end of the year in which the dam was completed, since the dam he built within the period of the term covered by the contract.

The opinion expressed by the commission during the discussion of the question was that possibly the application had been made with the construction of the dam in the back of the head of the applicant.

Since Mr. Ainsworth has not accepted the contract as suggested by the commission, the inference naturally is that he was not offered just the concession he sought.

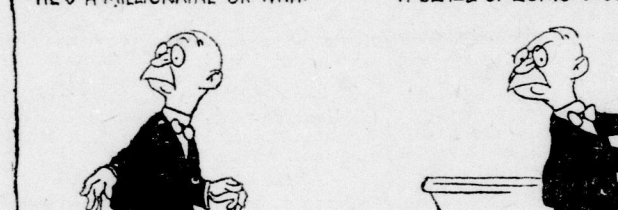

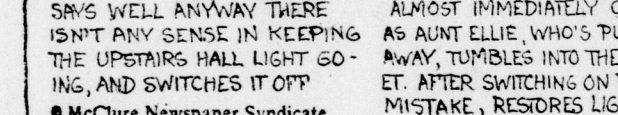

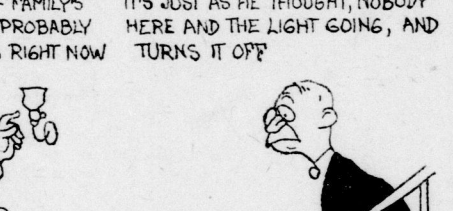

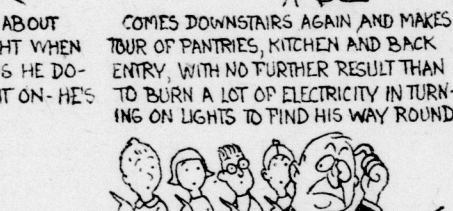

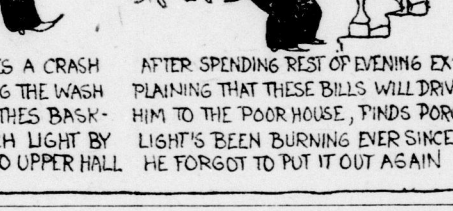

LURES POLICE FROM TRAIN BOARDS IT AGAIN, ESCAPES

Harry Radel, young Londoner, wanted in Winnipeg on a charge of theft, jumped from a train at Alliston, Ont., to escape the custody of a police officer who was accompanying him to the western city to stand trial. Radel cleverly foiled all attempts to seize him at the time, and would have succeeded in skipping the country but for the vigilance on Saturday night of Detective Elmer Walsh, a junction north of Toronto and about 100 miles from London. Radel, taking advantage of the delay, jumped through the door. The Winnipeg officer went after him, but Radel eluded him by again boarding the train as it was moving out, leaving the confused detective in Alliston.

British Scouts Get "Air Sense"

NEW ST. JAMES SESSION BOOSTS UNION FACTION

Congregational Letter Is Now Being Drafted—Members Are Divided.

The session of New St. James' Presbyterian church, North London, will on Wednesday next consider the draft of a letter to be forwarded to every member of the congregation on the question of church union. In accordance with instructions of the session the union committee has had the letter prepared by three of its members, G. A. Hebble, C. G. Thompson and Prof. W. J. Patterson.

A thorough canvass of the congregation is being made this week by the union association of New St. James' church to ascertain the attitude of the members to the question of church union.

The anti-unionists of the church are circulating a petition amongst the members of the congregation seeking the signature of the members pledging themselves to vote against church union, and thus preserve the identity of New St. James as a separate congregation apart from the United Church of Canada.

It is expected that public meetings will be held by both unionist and non-unionist factions in the congregation, with the unionist forces having the official support and approval of the session as such.

The opponents of church union in New St. James and holding a meeting Thursday night next to be addressed by Rev. Stuart Parker of Toronto and Rev. Henry Dickie of Montreal.

CITY CUSTOMS WORKERS UNWARE OF WAGE RAISE

Custom workers have received no word of the proposed increase in salaries which has been under consideration by the civil service commission at Ottawa. They hope that they may receive an official communication in a day or two.

The union officials of the custom employees have been negotiating with the federal government regarding increases and are hopeful of success. The negotiations have covered many months and at last appear to be bearing fruit.

C. P. R. SUBWAY SCHEME IS SUBSTY BY WENGE

"I would be in favor of saying start work tomorrow morning on a Wellington street subway at the C. P. R. tracks," said Mayor Wenge today, "but they don't work quickly in starting these things, and it will be some time before the street can be opened."

Asked if the railway board were coming here on Nov. 20 to take up the matter of having a Wellington street opened, Mayor Wenge declared he knew nothing of any proposed sessions here.

Last week the county sheriff received word from Ottawa, stating that if London desired a sitting of the railway board on Nov. 20, that date was open. So far, no request has been made for sittings here and it is not known now whether or not Wellington street plans will be available in time to present to the railway board this year.

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CROSS WORD PUZZLE NO. 12

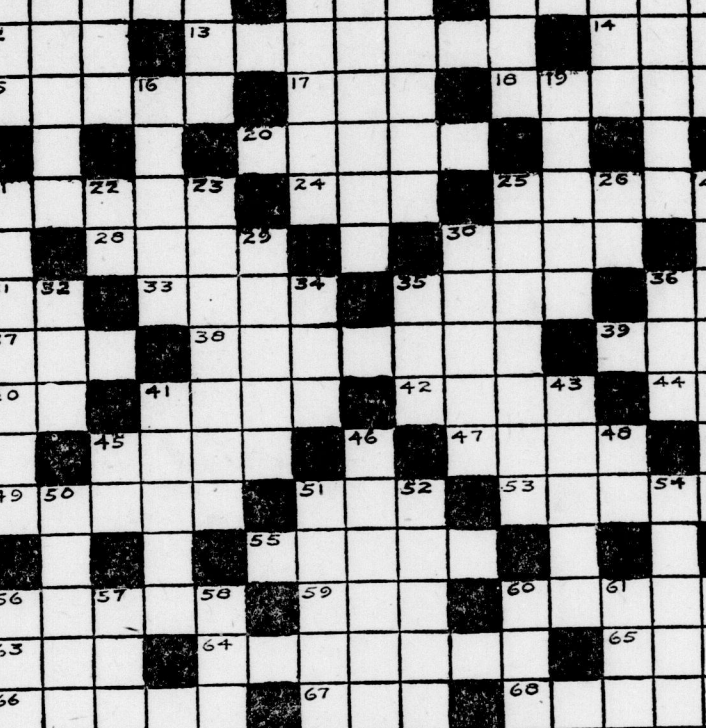

UTILITIES NOW SEEKS SITE FOR SUBSTATION

Handsone Offer of \$10,500 Fails, So Officials Must Search Elsewhere.

The public utilities commission has placed in the hands of a sub-committee, composed of Chairman Jared Vining, Commissioner Philip Pocock and Manager E. V. Buchanan, the task of securing a site for a new sub-station in the downtown section of the city.

A sub-station being absolutely necessary in the vicinity of Talbot and Carling streets, and having failed to secure the old registry office building, after offering for it a building price of \$10,500, the commission has been forced to look elsewhere in the district for a site upon which to build.

Negotiations are just about completed, it was learned today, for the purchase of property of sufficient size in the territory desired. Announcement of the completion of the agreement of the property in question to the commission will likely be made within the next few days.

The commission hopes to have the sub-station erected before the arrival of winter, and is pressing matters with this end in view.
